1. All subjects in capitals are required; three years of English are

2. Sixteen credits are required; a credit is given for the successful completion of one subject for one year 3. No credit for academic courses is given unless unit courses are completed in a satisfactory manner. Any one year subject is a unit course. Two years of a foreign language is a unit course. Partial credits for such activities as projects, music and public speaking are allowed. Students who expect credit in shorthand must als secure credit in typewriting.

Suggestions to Students in Electing Courses 1. No student can take more than four subjects without permission.

3. Students should elect their subjects according to the years they have been in high school. 4. Students who are not enrolled in the commercial or agricultural courses may take a subject in these courses if the class is not ematics or geography if the classes are not over-crowded.

 It is recommended that students who have completed one year of algebra should complete one year of geometry. 6. We believe that the purpose of the high school is two-fold: (1) four years of work and for those who will not continue their education upon graduation, and (2) to act as a college preparatory school. Students and parents should plan courses accordingly

College Entrance Requirements

. Students who plan to enter college should attempt to determine just which course they will pursue at college and they should 2. Those students who will enter college in 1935 or in 1936 will be permitted to do so under the "old" plan or the "new" plan. The "old" plan, in general, means that the student must present 12 academic credits including the following: English 3: mathematics 2 foreign language 2; social science 2; and laboratory science 1. In some instances only 10 academic credits are necessary. Courses eral science, community civics, and wood-shop are not considered to be academic. The student must present at least 15 or 16 credit. in all including of course the academic subjects. The "new" plan was adopted by all of the colleges in Michigan just recently and sequences. A sequence means that a student must study a certain subject for more than one year. He will have to complete two major sequences and two minor sequences in certain fields of acmathematics, social science, language and science. All students must present a major sequence in English. A major sequence in social science consists of European History, United States History, Government and Economics. In some instances Sociology or quence in science consists of Botany and Zoology, Chemistry and Physics, A major sequence in Mathematics consists of Algebra 11/2 and Geometry 11/2. Trigonometry may be substituted for Solid Geometry. Minor sequences may be earned in any of the above and also in Latin and French. In general, students who present 3. Those interested in Engineering should plan to complete the following credits: English 3 or more, Language 2 or more, laboratory

Wheat in Michigan it becomes important to remember that the Hessian fly should be controlled by observing the fly-free seeding dates recommended by the entomology department at Michigan State College.

Field surveys made this summer by that department show that the fly has increased in the past few years and will cause

past few years and will cause serious damage in fields sown before the proper time. The con-trol of the fly depends upon seed-ing the wheat after the time when the fly deposits eggs on

sprouting grain. Correct seeding dates vary in different places in Michigan, due to the more northerly location of some wheat growing sections and Quarterly meeting.

The earliest safe seeding date is Sept. 2 to 12 on high ground in Otsego county. The latest dates are Sept. 23 to Oct. 2 on low fields in Berrien and St. Joseph counties.
