Phones Valuable When Fires Occur

Department Figures Show Loss Is Less When Phone Is Handy

That the presence of a telephone in the home is of practical value in case of fire or any other emergency, is proven by statistics compiled by the St. Johns fire department for the past year. These statistics show a big difference in property loss, particularly in the rural districts, in case of fire where telephones were immediately available and where they were not. During the year the property under risk in fires was valued at \$79,500, and the loss amounted to \$7,492.

Where telephones were handy there was a total loss of \$1,250 with \$24,000 worth of property under risk. On the other hand, there were no telephones available where property worth \$55,000 was at stake, and the loss reached \$6,242.

A little figuring will show that the percentage of loss where the alarm was quickly given by phone was only about half of one per cent while in cases where no phone was available, the percentage of loss reached better than 11 per cent. Quite a difference. —Clinton County Republican News.
