Opportunity Knocks At Doors of Lowell

(EDITORIAL)

CERTAIN INDISPURABLE facts about the proposed \$70,000 addition to Lowell High School deserve to be emphasized again before Friday's balloting.

First, the addition will not increase taxes at all. Extra revenues are not necessary to finance the town's share of the expense, and the school board does not have the power, as some may fear, to slap on a tax in the future.

Secondly, the federal government is supplying 45 per cent of the cost, or \$31,909, as an outright gift. The school district's share is only \$39,000.

Thirdly, the addition is needed badly. The school has been crowded the past few years and enrollment is increasing. Every room is in use and still classes are cramped and storeroom space is lacking.

Fourthly, that an addition to the school building will be an asset to the community. If Lowell is enabled to attract more country students, it means they will spend money here and their families will think of Lowell as "their town."

Lowell needs and wants the high school addition. Taxpayers, don't fail to vote Friday and to vote for it. And remember, when you do so, that your taxes WILL NOT BE INCREASED.
