### THE RIVER OF GREEN

THE PAST few weeks have seen an enormous cut in the forests for use as Christmas trees. As these enormous supplies of foliage are moved over the railroads to every town in the land, they are like a river of green, bearing good cheer and reminders of bright nature.

### THE CHRISTMAS RUSH

THE AMERICAN people are governed a good deal by their emotions, and they manifest various eccentricities. A stranger from a foreign land would say that the rush to buy the people to buy and send off holiday gifts during the week before Christmas, is a singular manifestation of the national temperament.

Such a stranger would not find fault with the spirit which prompts these gifts. He would say that this custom creates a great deal of happiness. But the idea that all these people should concentrate in crowds to do one thing at the same time, is a thoroughly abnormal proceeding, and one causing much inconvenience and considerable real suffering.

He would say that calm and sensible folks would take pains to attend to this matter a considerable time before the holiday. They would distribute this period of rush over a longer time. But as it is now, we have this grand scrimmage, and it imposes severe burdens on many. Postal employees dread the holiday season, as a period of intense overwork, when they have to go to their nerves, and keep jumping every minute in the air.

### DISPLACED BY MACHINERY

MACHINERY for cotton picking is now being tried out, which may revolutionize the cotton growing industry. One such machine in Arizona is reported to have picked 600 pounds in three hours. The cost of the machine picking is called \$1 per acre, about one-fifth as much as hand picking. Now what would happen to the 2,000,000 workers in the cotton fields, if the crop they gather is largely picked by machinery at some future date?

Such things have constantly happened in industry on a small scale. As machinery is often introduced where one man can do the work of a dozen or a hundred. What shall be done with the dozen or the hundred? If cotton picking by machinery should become the regular thing, what shall be done with the men who are displaced ever known so far.

Some people say the use of new machinery should be restricted. But to do that stops progress. If we had stopped the introduction of automobiles because they displaced the carriage makers, the country's progress would have been retarded. And the automobiles have apparently given work to more people than the horses and carriages ever employed.

### THE MENACE

HE SAW the yellow mark ahead, as up the hill he roared, he could not wait for passing space, such slow speed made him bored; so far out to the left he swung, just as he neared the top, another car came into view, there was no time to stop. ## LEGIONNAIRES ENTERTAIN 200 AT BIG BANQUET

### Kent-Ottawa Vets Hear Kefgen, Others

Lowell has placed itself nationally on the map with its great showboat, Leslie P. Kefgen, Bay City, American Legion Chairman of the American Legion and former state commander, told an audience of more than 200 Fifth District Legionnaires and Auxiliary members at the banquet and dance in the City hall last Friday evening.

Speaking on "Americanism," Mr. Kefgen declared this country is being infected with "un-American doctrine and propaganda from a dozen sources. The highest aim of the American Legion is the inculcating of the principles of Americanism in the individual, community, state and nation, he stated.

The state legion has sponsored a WPA project for the manufacture of 12,000 American flags, to be placed in the public schools, Mr. Kefgen said. Four cardinal legion objectives are: (1) War against subversive activities; (2) Universal doctrine and propaganda; (3) Youth activities; (4) Safety in traffic.

The work of the auxiliary in fostering preparedness, youth guidance, and holiday observance was discussed by Mrs. James Sweeney of Howell, American Legion Chairman, Grace Murphy of District Committee No. 1, Lonnee of Sparta and Mrs. Joan Danhoff of Zeeland, District Auxiliary Committeewoman, responded to the address of welcome by President John A. Arenhart of Lowell, and Mrs. Carl Goetz of Monroe, Department Vice President of the Auxiliary, extended department greetings. Attorney R. M. Shivel, as toastmaster, called upon Dr. H. P. Gotfredsen to introduce the distinguished guests, included were the medical staff of Battle Creek veterans' hospital, and several legionnaires of state wide prominence.

## Frank Keech, Moseley Business Man, Dies

Frank Keech, well known and popular business figure of Moseley, died at his home there at midnight, Saturday, after an illness of two months.

Mr. Keech, who was 59, belonged to the pioneer Alton community family. At an early age he engaged in the retail mercantile trade, selling groceries from a horse-drawn wagon, building up a wide circle of friends and earning a reputation as a kindly, capable and intelligent tradesman, active in every movement for the betterment of his community. He conducted a store at Alton for some time and when the Pere Marquette Railway opened a Moseley station, the Keech store was removed to that village, where it has been conducted continuously for the past 26 years.

Surviving are the widow, a daughter, Miss Velma Keech of Kalamazoo, and two sons, Clair and Lee, of Moseley.

## NATIONAL GOVT TURNS RELIEF BACK TO STATE

### Local Subdivisions To Pay Cost

With the gigantic WPA program calculated to care for all employable relief clients, the federal government has turned over to the state and its political subdivisions—the entire administration of direct relief formerly administered by the federal government. Divided this expense, twelve million dollars annually from the sales tax being matched by an equal amount from the federal government.

### Township Case Loads

According to figures compiled about six weeks ago, three Kent County townships—Walker, Paris and Wyoming, have a larger case load than Lowell, with approximately one hundred individual relief cases. Ada had 28 families, totaling 83 persons, and 12 single individuals. Wyoming, adjacent to Grand Rapids, possessed 166 families of 442 persons, and 38 single individuals. Gratian was listed at one family of six persons and six individuals. Courtland had one family of three people and five single persons on relief. Bowne had four families, totaling nine persons, and three single individuals. Vergennes had six families of nine persons, and nine single individuals. The figures may be slightly larger now because of the unavoidable winter increase. The city of Rockford, with one family of two persons and two single individuals, is the only township with a prosperous, large-scale industry, can do for a community, the activities of the Wolverine Shoe company having virtually eliminated the necessity for relief.

The total annual Kent County relief cost for the year ending Sept. 30, 1935 was listed at \$909,900 of which Grand Rapids city contributed \$678,600.

The Works Progress Administration is now one of the largest, if not the largest single employer of laboring Michigan. Ninety thousand men and women, converted from welfare dependents into family providers, are on its payroll. The WPA is spreading \$1,500,000 a week over the State in wages and for materials.

Frank C. Kilpatrick, treasurer of the Woodland Mutual Fire Insurance Company, has been elected secretary to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Wm. H. Lind at a meeting of the board of directors of the company held at Woodland. E. L. Schanz, director, and former Nashville banker, was named treasurer to succeed Mr. Kilpatrick.

Many observers wondered why the "Trans-Pacific Flight," "China Clipper" was held up for two weeks to give stamp enthusiasts a chance to get their letters aboard for the first flight. The answer seems that philately now ranks as a big business; nearly 10,000,000 collectors spend \$6,000,000 yearly on their hobby; when the "China Clipper" took off for the far East he carried 58 pouches of mail, carrying 110,000 pieces at a net profit to the Post Office of \$30,000. First day's sale of new 5-cent air mail stamps celebrating the flight was \$69,432.—Tekonsha Patriot.

Exemption of consumers who buy their potatoes in retail establishments from the penalties for violation of the Potato Control Act was the subject of the AAA. The act of the AAA was interpreted in some quarters as another effort by the Farm Administration to offset possible consumer opposition to the law.

Safe-driving pledges and windshield stickers of the State Safety Council, bearing the words, "I Drive Safely," can now be procured at the Ledger office. When an applicant buys his 1936 plates he will be asked to help in Michigan's year-round safety drive by putting his name to a pledge and by committing himself thus over his own signature to a program of intelligent operation. If he does not wish to sign such a pledge but will agree verbally to use care on the roads, a windshield sticker will be placed in him along with his number plates. A million State stickers will be on cars by January 15, it is estimated.
