FOR THE AMERICAN SYSTEM THE LONG anticipated split between industry and the New Deal has occurred at last.

For almost three years American business as a whole has had relatively little to say in opposition to the New Deal policies.

Not long ago the United States Chamber of Commerce adopted a number of pointed resolutions opposing the New Deal theories.

These delegates asserted that "the American system has failed." They protested "blind experimentation and hasty legislation which undermine the American system and ignore America's brilliant record of accomplishment."

They said that "the first need of the country, in the interests of recovery, prosperity and progress, is an assurance of the preservation of the principles and guarantees underlying the American system."

They then adopted a platform for 1936, that in the light of their last year's platform, which said little save vaguely "cooperation" to the administration, is remarkably aggressive.

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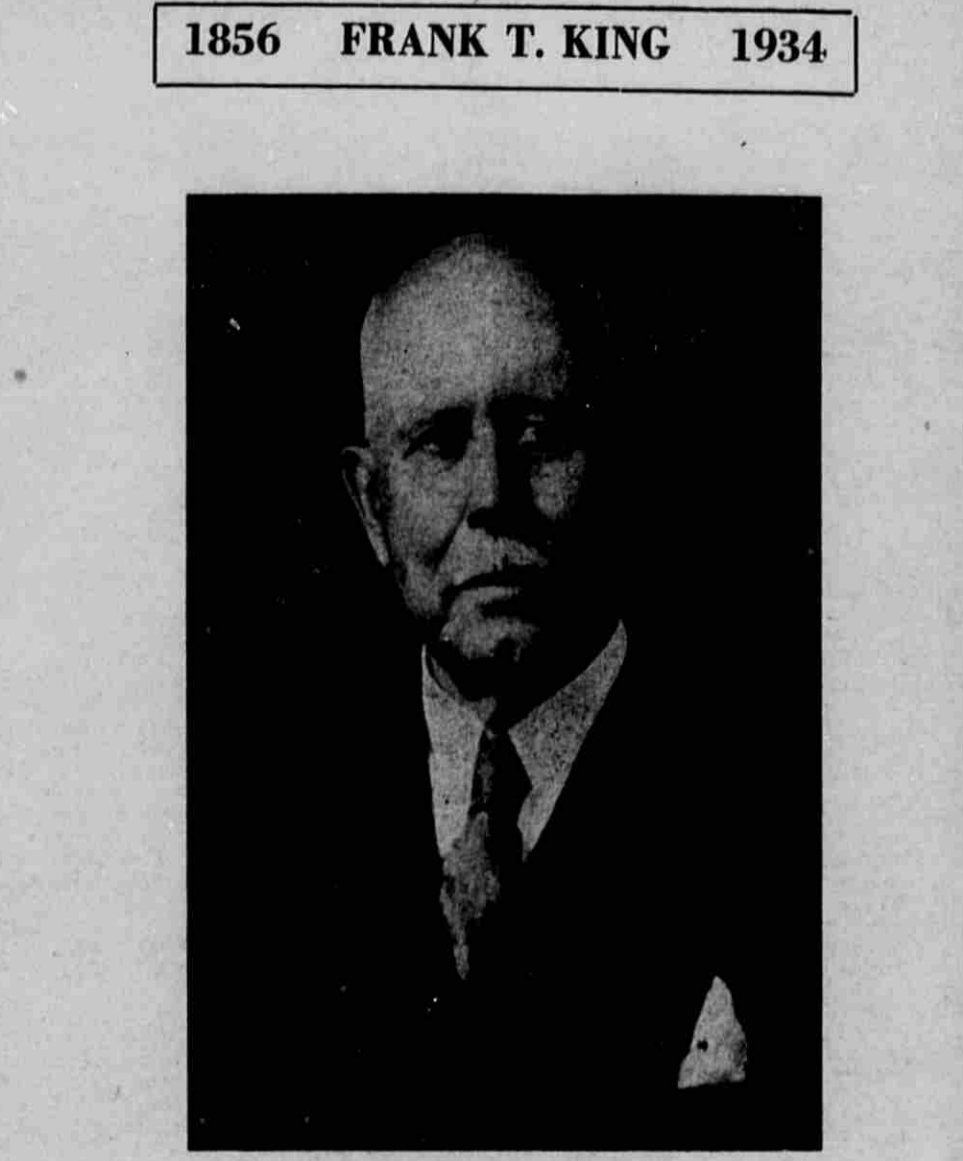
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1856 FRANK T. KING 1934

Mr. Harold Boring and baby daughter returned home from the Luz maternity hospital, Saturday.

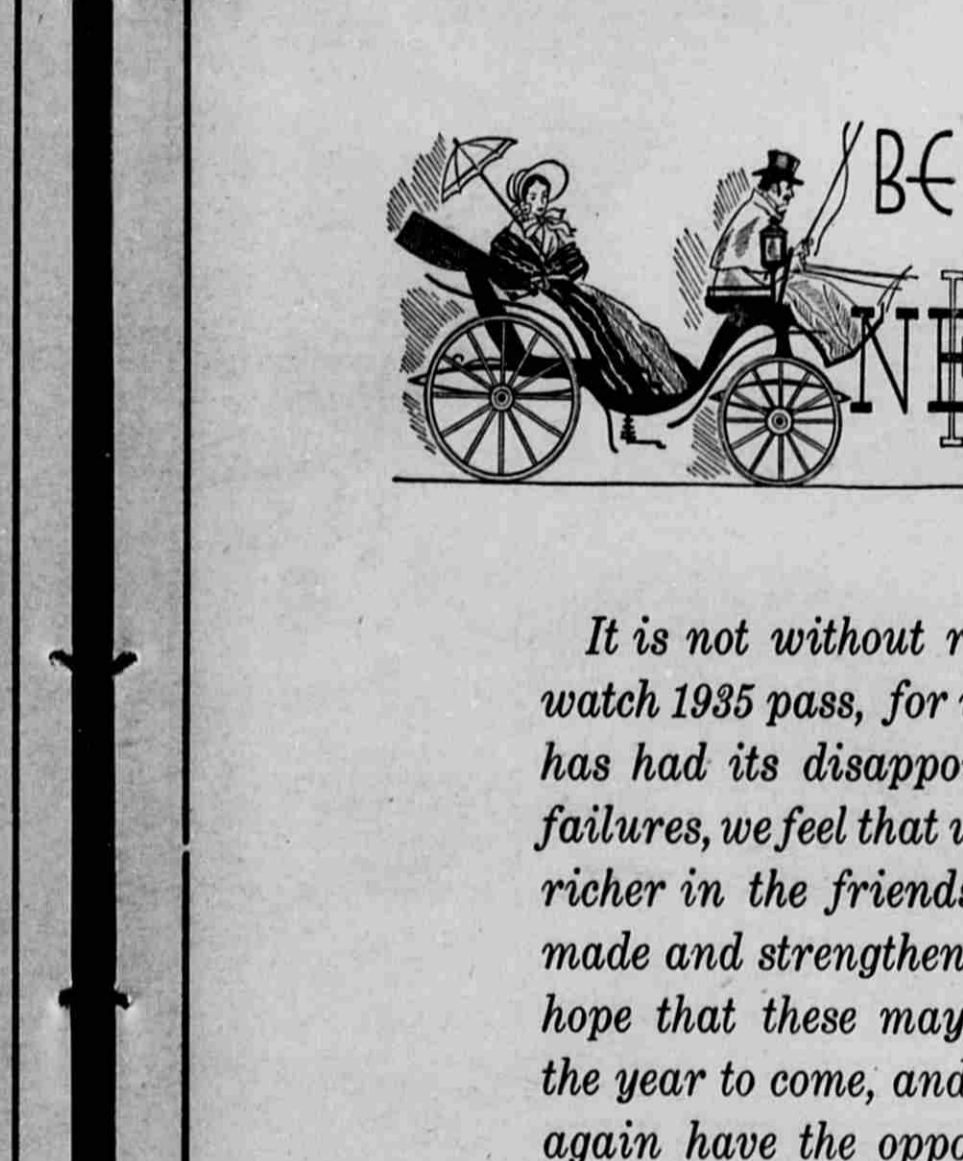

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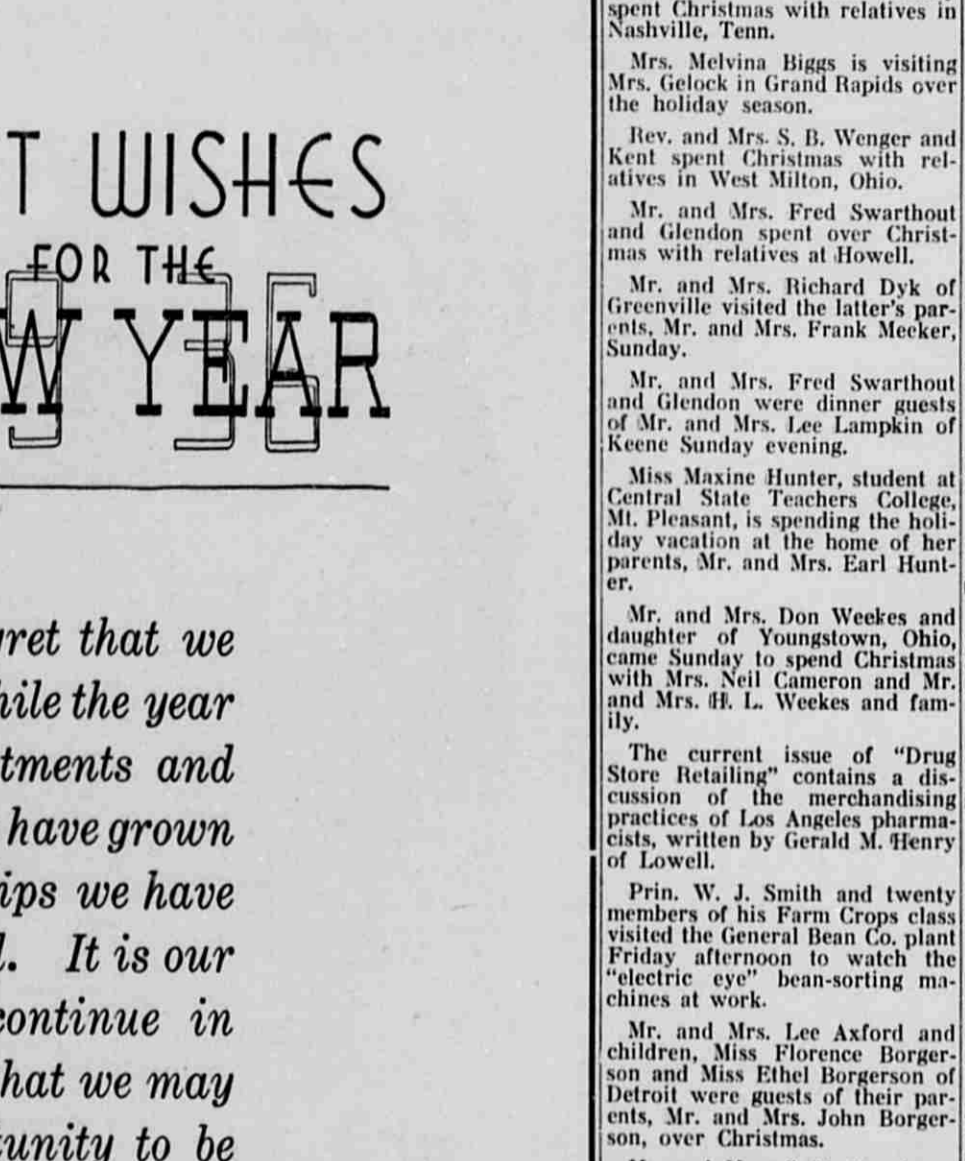
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
