

TAXES ON CORPORATIONS

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT'S new plan for taxes aims to obtain \$620,000,000 more out of the corporations, largely by assessing undistributed profits which these companies lock up in surpluses. It seems at first thought a rather easy way to get needed money. It would encourage the corporations to declare dividends of all the money they had earned, which would semone money in circulation. How such a plan would work in the long run is another question. The corporations like to build up surpluses, so they can keep declaring dividends and paying wages through hard times. This measure would perhaps help us out of our present hole, but if made permanent, it might dig a deeper me for the future.
