Planting Walleyes To Lure Sportsmen

Five hundred thousand walleye pike, of fry or pin size, were planted in Murray Lake Saturday morning under auspices of the Lowell Rod & Gun Club. The fish were reared at Comstock Park hatcheries. Anglers luck grows better each year at this popular resort, despite the prevalence of dogfish and bill fish, predatory species very destructive to edible fish. Conservation authorities several seasons ago attempted to seine out the destroyers, but were successful in netting only a comparative few. Regardless, many good catches of bass and pickerel were reported last year.

The walleyes, part of a shipment of 34,625,000, came in the egg to the hatchery from Saginaw Bay, where they were collected by commercial fishermen during the spring spawning run, heaviest in great lakes waters. The young walleyes are being planted in inland lakes throughout Michigan. A heavy plant will be made in Grand River between Grand Rapids and Portland, according to Claude Lyell, superintendent of the Comstock hatchery.
