Electric Fountain Is On Wild Journey Appeal to State

With a tremendous splash which nearly swamped the "Maid of the Mist," the Lowell Showboat fountain went over Niagara Falls at 10:15 a.m. last Monday. The fountain, floating with even keel at about four knots an hour, entered Lake Michigan from the mouth of Grand River early last fall. A lighthouse keeper on Lake Huron radiogrammed dispatches here two months later that the fountain, its colored lights blazing flercely, had passed his station late the night before. Crowds estimated at 100,000 cheered lustily as the pride of the village floated gallantly underneath Ambassador Bridge at Detroit, and several Lake Eric captains have reported sighting her since. It is believed the fountain is headed across the Atlantic Ocean, with a message of good will from the people of this community to Halle Selassie.
