





MAYOR TUNIS JOHNSON

Mr. Johnson was born in Grand Rapids, March 28, 1885. At the age of four years he removed with his parents to Lowell, where his father, Gerrit J. Johnson, established a cigar business on the present site of the Superior Furniture Company. The family residence was on the "New" addition, then actually new. Later the Johnsons removed to the North Monroe residence now the North Monroe residence now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Harry Stauffer. It was the custom of Mr. and Mrs. Johnson, accompanied by their young son, to take Sunday afternoon strolls in Elleworth's woods aget of Ock.

"I have always felt the happiest days of my Dad's life were spent in Lowell," Mayor Johnson declared recently.

In the leanto of the house, Mr. Johnson had his work bench, where he hand rolled, three boxes at a time, a cigar which he called the "S. C. W.," (Spanish Cigar Works). Via horse and buggy the cigars would be sold, a box at a time, to nearby crossroads stores, of which there were more than at present. On the reroads stores, of which there were more than at present. On the return frip it was Mr. Johnson's practice to paint on board fences the cryptic message, "Smoke S. C. W. Cigars." Bert E. Quick, who accompanied Mr. Johnson on these jaunts, says the signs afforded an early demonstration of the power of advertising.

Time after time, in the local drug stores of Will S. Winegar and Ben E. West, the playlet repeated itself:

"Have a cigar, George!"

"Have a cigar, George!"
"Don't mind if I do!"
"What'll it be?" (Business of examining all the brands in the case, none of which, obviously was familiar).

"Oh, gimme an S. C. W."

A present-day scientific advertising counsel would explain that Mr. Johnson was simply pioneering in "impulse merchandising," but let that pass. The sales of the S. C. W. grew and grew, to become the Johnson Cigar Company's big leader. Later he added a brand named for one of the great paintings of his native Holland, Rembrandt's "Syndic of the Cloth Makers' "Syndic of the Cloth Makers' Guild," termed the "Dutch Masters." Through the cigar this painting is probably better known than any other ageless work of visual art.

G. J. Johnson was very active in the business and social life of Lowell. He became a member of Lodge No. 90. F. & A. M. which

Lodge No. 90, F. & A. M., which organization honored him with a life membership some years later, and sang in the choir of the Congregational church during the pastorate of Rev. J. T. Husted.

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
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
