Grease Cheaper Than Metal Rust

There may be some question about whether it costs less to house machinery than to let it weather and depreciate faster, but there is no question that grease is cheaper than rust and wear, advises E. C. Sauve, assistant professor in agricultural engineering at Michigan State College.

Frequently Sauve is asked by a farmer, "How long will my tractor last?" There seems to be no specific answer, says Sauve, but for the purpose of estimating annual depreciation he approximates the average life of a tractor at ten years. Annual depreciation is thus ten per cent, and this estimate applies as well to other farm machinery.

"Depreciation in farm machinery is due to two causes, wear and deterioration may be caused by neglect on the part of the owner in properly carbon.



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



Grease Cheaper

There may be some question about whether it costs less to house machinery than to let it weather and depreciate faster, but there is no question that grease is cheaper than rust and wear, advises E. C. Sauve, assistant professor in agricultural engineering at Michigan State College.

Frequently Sauve is asked by a farmer, "How long will my tractor last?" There seems to be no specific answer, says Sauve, but for the purpose of estimating annual depreciation in a proximates the average life of a tractor at ten years.
