## ACCEPTING THE RESULT

ONE OF THE most wonderful things about the American system of government, as contrasted with systems of so-called democratic government prevailing elsewhere, is the calm and disciplined way in which our people accept the result when defeated at elections.

In many other countries, the voting by ballot is only a preliminary to another kind of election. In that second election, the voting is not done by ballots. It is done by bullets, or the threat of them. The defeated parties get together and try to get the army on their side. If the soldiers favor them, the fact that the election went against them will not count.

Or if they can raise a mob of excited people who will overtake the forces of law and order, they are ready to do so. The real ruling power is not found in the people voting at the polls. Sometimes the national army will control the government, and will use its power to create a revolution. Sometimes a wild mob overtakes the government.

## THE FIRESIDE BLAZE

WHEN the autumn months come, the fire on the open hearth cheers millions of families through the crisp and cool evenings. In former times the family used to spend many hours in front of the dancing flames. People had heart to talk before the fireside, and discussed everything from cooking pumpkin pie to the tariff and foreign relations.

The fire on the hearth stirs currents of memory, of former days and old faces one used to see. It is said that people do not stay at home as they used to, that they want to be on the go all the time. When you build a fireplace into the house, and start a fire there frequently, it makes home seem sweeter, and the evening at home more delightful.

NOVEMBER 11  
**ARMISTICE DAY** brings more vivid memories than other holidays. July Fourth simply refers to a grand historical fact, far back in the ancient history of the nation. It is often hard to make it seem real and vivid. The majority of our people have a very clear memory of November 11, 1918, and of the surging and tumultuous emotions that reached their climax at that historic date.

Fear and anxiety had risen to a swelling tide in the hearts of the people. Millions of families picked up their newspapers with horror, dreading bad news. They feared to see the mail or telegraph messenger coming, dreading lest some bad announcement was coming. The families of the boys in the camps awaited with tense anxiety the day when they should be sent to the front.

The families that had no sons in the army had plenty of things to fear. If national defeat came, they knew that their own lives might threaten their own security.

Into this atmosphere, trembling with anxiety, came the peal of the bells on Armistice Day, with the joyful word that all that horror was at an end. Never before has there been such an exultant day in the life of the nation. Never before were such enthusiastic celebrations. Never before did the heart of the nation so respond to the removal of anxiety and despair.

The events that have occurred in the 18 years since that date seem an anti-climax. Things have not gone as the nation expected. Many hopes have been disappointed. But the same power and force that led the nation to victory in 1918, are still with us. They can lead us to greater victories of peace and human welfare if properly organized and directed.

**BUSINESS ORGANIZATIONS**  
BACK 60 years ago, there were only about 50 organizations in the country performing the work of a Chamber of Commerce or Board of Trade. Today there are probably 5,000 of them.

The formation of all these societies has added enormously to the power of cities and towns. Formerly there was no organized force in most cities and towns working for improved conditions. The people wanted progress, but they had no system for getting it. Their desires were like a river which flows down to the sea in a series of rapids, without any power development. Such a river turns to wheels of power. If you build dams and erect power plants, that river turns the wheels in a thousand mills. So when you organize a business or community association, you take power that was going to waste and make it produce results.

## Odds and Ends

The Bay View, last of the whalebacks, those first streamlined vessels so familiar a sight on our great Lakes generation ago, is being junked in Chicago.

A bumper crop of turkeys, the largest on record, is available for Thanksgiving Day. The Department of Agriculture estimates that twenty million turkeys have been produced this year, one-third more than last year.

Better than even money bets are being made in official circles that the old-age insurance plan in the Social Security program will not operate as intended because of what is being recognized as impossible administrative difficulties.

A total of 503 persons will have no legal right to hunt deer during the 16-day open season beginning Nov. 15 because state law forbids the issuance of licenses to those who have violated the deer laws or killed or wounded another hunter in the woods.

While a Governor may either appoint a United States Senator to fill a vacancy or call a special election, there is no such option as to any vacancy in the House. Every Representative must be chosen either at a general or special election.

In the event of death of a President-elect, the Vice President-elect automatically would become President on inauguration day, but if both should die, or fail to qualify, Congress is empowered to provide by law for selection for both offices.

Those in a position to know say that the recent stabilization agreement contains a joker on which the whole plan could quickly founder. This is that only the United States gives any sort of a promise to buy and sell gold at a particular price in its currency.

Colleges are reporting a marked increase in enrollment in vocational courses as compared with liberal arts courses this year. The trend is attributed to greater desire among students for courses which are apt to insure quick employment after graduation.

At the 37th International Live Stock Exposition, Nov. 28 to Dec. 5, leading stockmen and farmers of North America will join those of distant lands in staging the largest exhibition of purebred breeds, prime market animals and farm crops ever seen in the United States, declared the promoter.

Transportation and industrial hazards are the two most important causes of accidents. Dr. John J. Moorehead of Columbia University attributes three-fifths of all injuries to transportation accidents and one-fifth to industrial causes. Among sports football is the most hazardous, polo is the second most dangerous. Wrestling ranks third.

Enough paper to supply a quantity double the amount used annually in the United States could be manufactured from wheat, oat, rye and other straws grown on farms in the central area of the United States. This estimate is made by the National Bureau of Standards in announcing a new process which has developed for making paper pulp out of straw.

Persistence may get Mrs. Anna Howk of Grand Rapids \$172. In 1932 she sent a bill for that sum to the City Commission claiming damages to a house the city had used for social service clients. The commissioners turned down the claim. They got it again in 1933, 1934, 1935 and this week once more said "No," to Mrs. Howk's claim. But 1937 is coming.

Wayne L. Steeby and Jarold A. Raab of Caledonia are among the 95 enrolled in the 16 weeks general short course in agriculture at Michigan State College, East Lansing. Classes in the short course began October 27. The course, which requires two winter terms for completion, includes studies in livestock, dairy cattle, crops, poultry, beekeeping, farm accounting, farm engineering and agricultural economics.

## Reservoir Project Is Nearly Finished

Following investigation by Trustee B. H. Shepard and Clerk L. E. Johnson, which included conferences with County Engineer Otto S. Hess and others, it was decided to purchase for approximately \$500, an oil reclaiming which will be used to reclaim and purify for re-use about 400 gallons of oil consumed monthly in village trucks and cars, and in the diesel engine at the Municipal Light & Power Plant. The anticipated saving will exceed 20c per gallon.

This is based on the average speed of 140 words a minute, or 8,000 an hour. Also taken into consideration is the fact that such broadcasting goes via a network and the price range is controlled by the size of the chain or chains used. For instance, approximately \$15,000 buys an hour on NBC and \$12,000 on CBS, full station groups.

### WHY Punishment Contrary to Law Is Called Lynching.

Punishment given a person with out authority of law, called lynching, was said to be given under the Lynch law, the kind of law administered by Charles Lynch (1730-90) a Virginia planter, who early in the Revolution, with his neighbors, Robert Adams and Thomas Calloway undertook to protect society and support the revolutionary government in the region where he lived on the Staunton river; by punishing with stripes or banishment such lawless or disaffected persons as were accused.

According to tradition, Tories brought before this informal court were often hung up by their thumbs until they cried, "Liberty forever!" but the penalty of death was never inflicted. The origin of the term is often erroneously ascribed to his brother, John Lynch, the founder of Lynchburg, Va. who was a Quaker all his life. The notion that the term originated in the action of a mayor of Galway in Ireland, one James Fitzstephen Lynch, who is said to have executed the law upon his own son by hanging him, in 1488, is said to be erroneous.—Indianapolis News.

### Why Men Seeking Office Are Called Candidates

In an election we vote for this candidate or that candidate, according to individual choice. But why are they called candidates? This custom of calling people running for political office candidates dates back to ancient Rome. During a political canvass in that ancient city it was customary for persons seeking the highest elective office to appear in the forum and other public places dressed in white togas, the white of the natural wool being brightened with chalk. The Latin word for white is candidus, and an office seeker so clad was called candidatus, whence our word candidate. Incidentally, the white toga was intended to signify the candidate's purity of purpose in soliciting the suffrage of the people. But candidates don't wear white togas today.—Pathfinder Magazine.

### Why Flowers Fade Quickly

There are two mistakes commonly made in cutting flowers for in door use. One is to wait until they are fully opened, often until they have been open for several days, before cutting them. The other is to cut them during the heat of the day, when they are in ideal condition to wilt. Most flowers are best cut when in full bud, or just as they are beginning to open. There are, of course, some exceptions to this, such as dahlias, which do not expand fully until after three to five days after the buds have unfolded. As a general rule flowers will open more nearly perfect and will last longer, if taken just as the buds are opening.

### Why It Was "The Big Wind"

The big wind occurred in Ireland on the night of January 6, 1830. In Limerick, Galway, and Athlone, hundreds of houses were blown down and hundreds more were burned by the spreading of fires from those blown down. It was called the big wind because it was the worst of its kind known to the people of Ireland. The big wind was a recent and memorable event at the time of the Irish emigration to America following the famine of 1845-46, so that its memory has been preserved among the descendants of the emigrants.

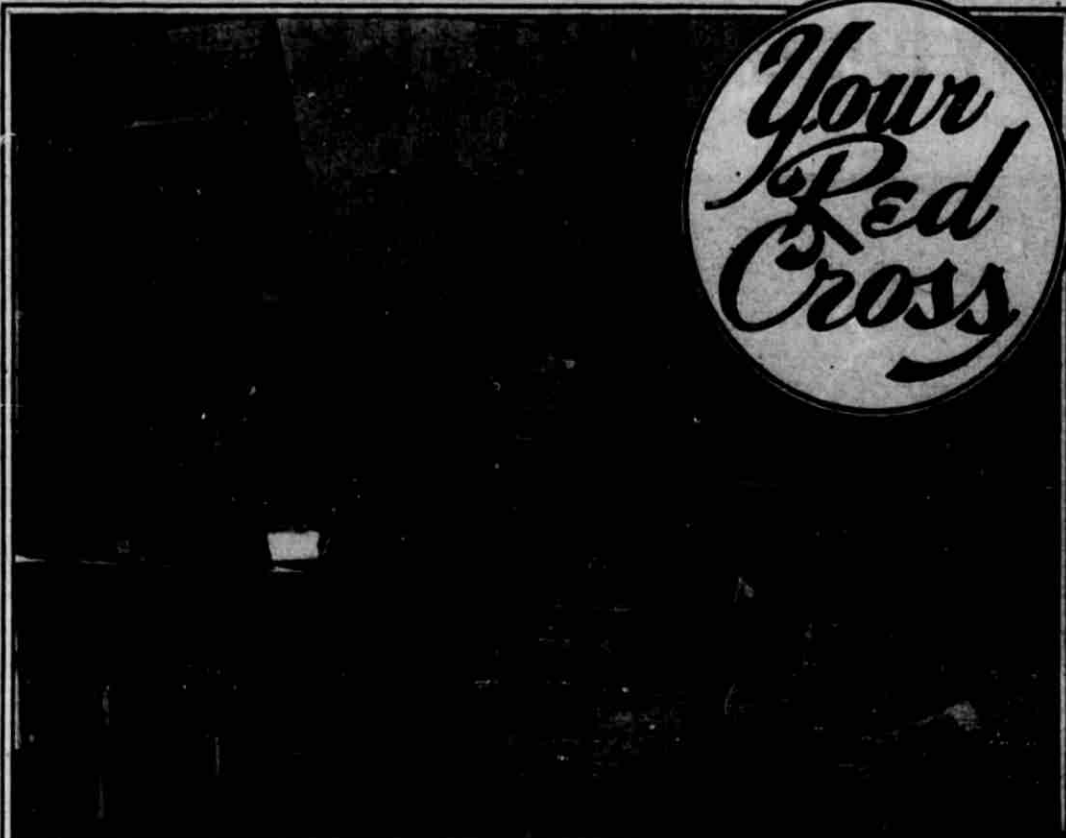

### WHY

#### Punishment Contrary to Law Is Called Lynching.

Punishment given a person without authority of law, called lynching, was said to be given under the Lynch law, the kind of law administered by Charles Lynch (1730-95), a Virginia planter, who early in the Revolution, with his neighbors, Robert Adams and Thomas Calloway undertook to protect society and support the revolutionary government in the region where he lived, on the Staunton river, by punishing with stripes or banishment such lawless or disaffected persons as were accused.

According to tradition, Tories brought before this informal court were often hung up by their thumbs until they cried, "Liberty forever!" but the penalty of death was never inflicted. The origin of the term is often erroneously ascribed to his brother, John Lynch the founder of Lynchburg, Va., who was a Quaker all his life. The notion that the term originated in the action of a mayor of Galway in Ireland, one James Fitzstephen Lynch, who is said to have executed the law upon his own son by hanging him, in 1493, is said to be erroneous.—Indianapolis News.

#### Why Men Seeking Office Are Called Candidates

This custom of calling people running for political office candidates dates back to ancient Rome. The Latin word for white is candidus, and an office seeker so clad was called candidatus, whence our word candidate. Incidentally, the white toga was intended to signify the candidate's purity of purpose in soliciting the suffrage of the people. But candidates don't wear white togas today.—Pathfinder Magazine.

#### Why Flowers Fade Quickly

There are two mistakes commonly made in cutting flowers for indoor use. One is to wait until they are fully opened, often until they have been open for several days, before cutting them. The other is to cut them during the heat of the day, when they are in ideal condition to wilt. Most flowers are best cut when in full bud, or just as they are beginning to open. There are, of course, some exceptions to this, such as dahlias, which do not expand fully until after three to five days after the buds have unfolded. As a general rule flowers will open more nearly perfect and will last longer, if taken just as the buds are opening.

#### Why It Was "The Big Wind"

The big wind occurred in Ireland on the night of January 6, 1839. In Limerick, Galway, and Athlone, hundreds of houses were blown down and hundreds more were burned by the spreading of fires from those blown down. It was called the big wind because it was the worst of its kind known to the people of Ireland. The big wind was a recent and memorable event at the time of the Irish emigration to America following the famine of 1845-46, so that its memory has been preserved among the descendants of the emigrants.

#### Why a Bee Hums

To begin with, when we say the bee hums, it is not the voice of the bee that we hear, because the bee cannot make any vocal sound. It is simply a vibration in the air. For that reason, you will never hear a bee hum when it is standing or crawling.
