

Educated Corn Beats the Borer



Parents at the left and center have helped give birth at Michigan State College to the new Michigan Hybrid No. 561 which yields more grain and will enable farmers in the state to grow more corn in spite of borer infestation.

In a paper submitted Nov. 18 to the agronomists at Washington by A. R. Marston, corn breeding expert in the farm crops department at Michigan State College, results of a 10 year program of progress were described. Specifically, the farm crops department has developed Michigan Hybrid No. 561 first distributed for commercial production in 1936.

Parents originally used by Marston were a commercial Michigan adapted yellow dent and an unadapted but borer resistant variety obtained from South America and known as maize amargo. The latter was tough stalked, but the grain was merely "tough" to look at, says Marston.


