THE SUPREME COURT AND HOW IT WORKS

"The Public Welfare"

THE Supreme court of the United States has frequently been called upon to act as umpire in cases where citizens protested that their health or their crops were endangered.

The number of such appeals have resulted in the elimination of conditions causing pollution of the water in an affected community must drink or contaminate of the air it must breathe.

In one instance a company made a practice of discharging waste material into a river, whose waters, further along the course, were utilized for irrigation purposes. A citizen whose crops and food supply were thus in jeopardy at the time of the Supreme court, which granted the injunction to prevent the company from continuing to pollute the river. An appeal was then carried to the United States Supreme court, which after hearing the case, granted the injunction.

In giving a right to use the waters of the public streams . . . the statute does not provide that such a user may send his waste material or debris down the stream to the detriment of substantial injury of the riparian rights of users of water. . . and no evasion of private property rights should be inferred or implied.

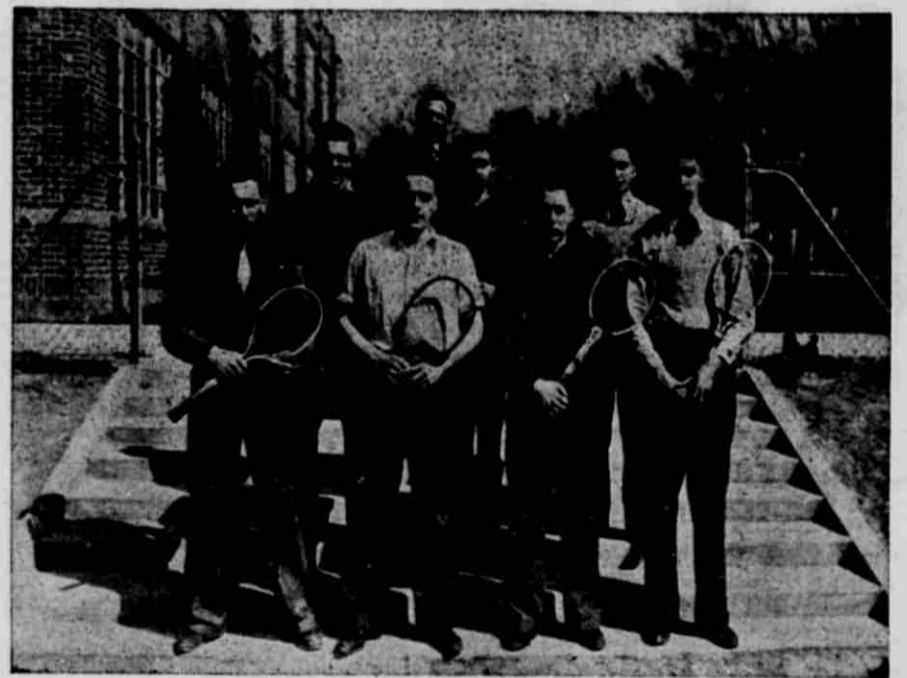
