A new type of endurance contest for horses is to be the opening feature of the annual Farmers' Day program which will attract thousands of farmers and their families to Michigan State College Friday, July 30.

In the annual view of better farming which rural businessmen of Michigan will get on the campus and farms, all of the agricultural departments of the college will offer demonstrations and information. Tests, research, new methods and new knowledge of fruit, grain, forage crops, pastures and truck crops, livestock, forestry, veterinary, agricultural engineering, soils and entomology are to be a part of the morning program.

This endurance test for horses, as announced by Ralph Hudson, farm superintendent, offers opportunity to any team in Michigan to match its heart and willingness against one good college pair of sorrel Belgian geldings.

The college animals are not trained specially for contest pulling. Although they weigh 3,000 pounds, any team of any weight has a good chance in this contest, which will be run from 10 to 10:30 a. m. to start the annual program.

Even a pair of light mustangs, if in good condition may win the endurance trophy offered by the Michigan Horse Breeders' association. Each team, of any weight, will pull a load of half the team's weight. The winning team will be the one that goes the best distance in the trials.

Hudson has set Wednesday, July 21, as the closing date for entries. He suggests training any entries by giving them pulls on a stone boat. After departmental programs, there is to be a central program in the afternoon in the center of the landscaped part of the campus.
