

This lowers the total United States crop to 391,707,000 bushels and the Michigan production to 29,715,000 bushals. There is a considerable percentage of No. 2 and cull grades n portions of practically all commercial potato states from Wisconsin eastward. The lower grades consist largely of under-sized potatoes although there are also considerable quantities affected by scab and some by hollow-heart. The cooking quality of the Michgan crop is much better than it has been in any recent year. Michgan ranks second among all states potato production. Production of Michigan apples is

ndicated at 14,432,000 bushels, and the largest crop for the State since 1920. Although summer rains interfered with spraying in some orchards, in general the fruit is of good quality. The United States crop is the largest since 1926. Large quantities of fruit in all sections of the country are being utilized by cider mills and pro-


