

In recent weeks, the leaders of each group have met at Lansing in an endeavor to formulate a program of legislative desires.

Here is the C.I.O. program, which if adopted by the legislature, would bring about the following:

1. A "little Wagner act" for Michigan. This would be administered presumably in much the same manner as the National Wagner act is handled by the National Labor Relations board. The national act accords to workers in interstate commerce the right of collective bargaining for betterment of their wages, hours and working conditions.
