Details Given Of Law Covering Old Age Assistance

Age Alone Does Not Qualify

Because of so much misunderstanding regarding the Old Age Assistance law and a desire on the part of many persons to know more of the essential features of the program, the Ledger is printing herewith extracts from a letter received from the State Welfare Department...

Old Age Assistance finds its place on the statute books of the state of Michigan as a temporary answer at least to the demand of society for support of aged, needy persons who are manifestly unable to earn a livelihood...

It is in no sense a pension although there remains a popular conception that the person who has passed the age of 65 years, no matter what the circumstances, is entitled by right to assistance from the State...

The Old Age Assistance program is designed primarily to give the aged person a feeling of security and yet remains flexible enough so that it cannot be considered a fixed charge against the state, the community or the federal government...

Eligibility of persons for old age assistance—which in no case may exceed in Michigan a maximum outlay of \$30 a month—is determined after careful investigation by representatives of the old age assistance bureau of the state welfare department...

There are certain qualifications which must be met by the aged person who may be considered eligible. He or she must be 65 years of age or older, have been a resident of this state for five years out of the immediately preceding nine years and at least one year preceding application...

Citizenship is not a requirement and the applicant is not denied the right to hold property. The value of the property is taken into consideration only to determine the income and extent of need.

An individual may own a piece of property from which there is a small income but not sufficient to meet taxes, light and heat charges and other expenses. Should the property be found to exceed \$5,000 in assessed valuation or if personal property, excepting household furniture, the value of which exceeds \$1,000 the applicant is denied assistance.

Farmer Finds Cure For Bindweed

Proof in the field of a control for the pesky bindweed has been found by a Michigan farmer at Unionville where four successive wheat crops have been produced while the weed evidently has been forced to yield to treatment.
In experiments and theories advanced by S. T. Dexter, crops specialist at Michigan State College, the fallow plowing and working immediately after wheat harvest has been suggested to farmers in the state.
Glenn Haggit was beginning to fear that the bindweed, also known as creeping jenny and wild morning glory was going to take over his most profitable acres on the farm he operates near Unionville. Four consecutive wheat crops and treatments in between seem to have eliminated the pest.
Haggit plowed immediately after harvest each summer and worked the land thoroughly until wheat planting time in the fall. In re-planting he used a liberal application of 2-12-6 fertilizer.
Thorough tillage after harvest, crops specialists explain, is the feature that makes the bindweed "give up the ghost."
Experiments for similar control of the weed have been undertaken in South Dakota and in Minnesota. Either rye or wheat as a crop has been used successfully in Minnesota while the South Dakota fight against the bindweed used winter rye instead of wheat.
