Week's Best Recipe

Baked Oranges: 4 seedless oranges, 3 cup white corn syrup, 2 cups sugar, 2 cups water. Grate oranges slightly to break oil cells in rind. Cook in boiling water 30 minutes until tender. Drain. Cut in halves. Mix syrup, sugar and water and cook five minutes. Pour syrup over oranges placed in casserole. Cover and bake at 350 degrees 1 1/2 hours.

Renew It!

If your linoleum shows signs of age, try painting it and stippling it. Before doing so remove old wax and grease with gasoline. Open all windows while doing this work. Use floor enamel or paint. Put on two coats. Stippling keeps a plain color from showing the soil. Stipple by using a sponge with flat surface. Take a board and put stippling color on it. Press sponge on stippling color and then on floor. This transfers pattern of sponge from board to floor.

Make Them

Cut a strip of oilcloth of colorful pattern if you desire that or plain color if you prefer and make strip the size of your old shades. Attach oilcloth to old rollers. Make a hem large enough for stick and fasten the curtain pulls. This makes a change for your kitchen and gives a pleasing color to your work room.

Household Hints:

Length of chain is handy for stringing coat hangers when airing clothes. Coat hangers may be placed as far apart as desired on chain without sliding together. A little starch in rinsing water for curtains will make them easier to iron and cause them to stay in place better. When cooking vegetable with a strong odor, cover vegetable with boiling water on top of which place the "heel" of a loaf of bread. Bread absorbs much of the odor. If soup is too salty add a raw potato and let soup boil for a few minutes. Potato absorbs much of the salt. When frying fish, first soak in milk, then dip in flour. This gives a golden crust to it.

Signs suggest that a first class inner-circle row is generating over this country's gold buying program, as a result of which the Treasury is exchanging an immense number of dollars for metal that many of the Government's best informed monetary experts regard as of doubtful future value. The argument is that the United States is being maneuvered into a position where it may finance the next war by purchases of gold.

Windstorm Co. Adds Over Four Millions Insurance

Up to May 1 the Michigan Mutual Windstorm Insurance Company of Hastings had paid 4,000 claims since the first of the year. Very few of them were heavy. They were largely due to strong winds on the 18th of March and February 12. There were no cyclones reported. The company has ample reserves to meet its losses in 1939 without borrowing a dollar.

The company is making progress as usual. During the month of May the agents added \$4,011,115 of new insurance. Very unfavorable weather that month made this a very good showing, evidencing a continuance of the good will toward this company, because of the fair adjustments and prompt payment of its losses and its square dealing.

Kent Wheat Goals Now Being Listed

John McCabe, Chairman of the Kent County Agricultural Conservation Association, announces that regular 1940 wheat listing sheets for Kent County are being prepared for all farms in the county that have wheat planted for harvest in any of the years of 1937, 1938 or 1939. When this step in listing procedure is complete, the County Committee, with the aid of each Community Committee, will immediately begin the determination of 1940 wheat goals. Immediately following the determination of wheat goals for regular wheat farms, the county office shall begin the mailing of notices to each owner for whom a goal has been determined. These goal notices should reach the farmer much earlier than ever before.

Mr. McCabe further states that any farmer who has not had wheat planted for harvest for 1937, 1938 or 1939, who desires a wheat goal for 1940, should immediately submit a written request to the County Committee for an allotment. This type of farm will be considered a new wheat farm. All such requests should reach the county office not later than June 10, 1939.

Water in Alfalfa May Rot Silage

Water in grass intended for silage offers Michigan farmers interested in this new system of conserving feed crops a chance to prove their guessing ability.

Despite a warning broadcast nationally that the extra moisture may cause silos to collapse, C. F. Huffman, dairy nutrition research professor at Michigan State College, sees other angles more important to the problem. Unless silos walls are so weak they may collapse, some drainage through cracks may even be an advantage, his surveys indicate.

In tests at the college duplicated on many Michigan farms in the past season, results indicate the grass or alfalfa must be in proper stage to make good silage.

The range apparently is between 80 and 75 per cent moisture when the result: feed turns out best.

At 75, 77 and up to 80 per cent moisture the solid mass fails to ensile and produces a rotten heap unfit for cattle feed. In one operation on the college fields the grass was cut when about 80 per cent moisture. Hot sunshine dried it out before it was put into the silo so water was added to bring the moisture up. Too much was added, Huffman discovered, because this experimental portion spoiled.

Increased interest in making good silage results from frequent unsuitable weather during laying time for first cuttings. Trials indicate that cutting grass for silage when fairly mature obtains the approximately suitable moisture percentage, lessening likelihood of spoilage.

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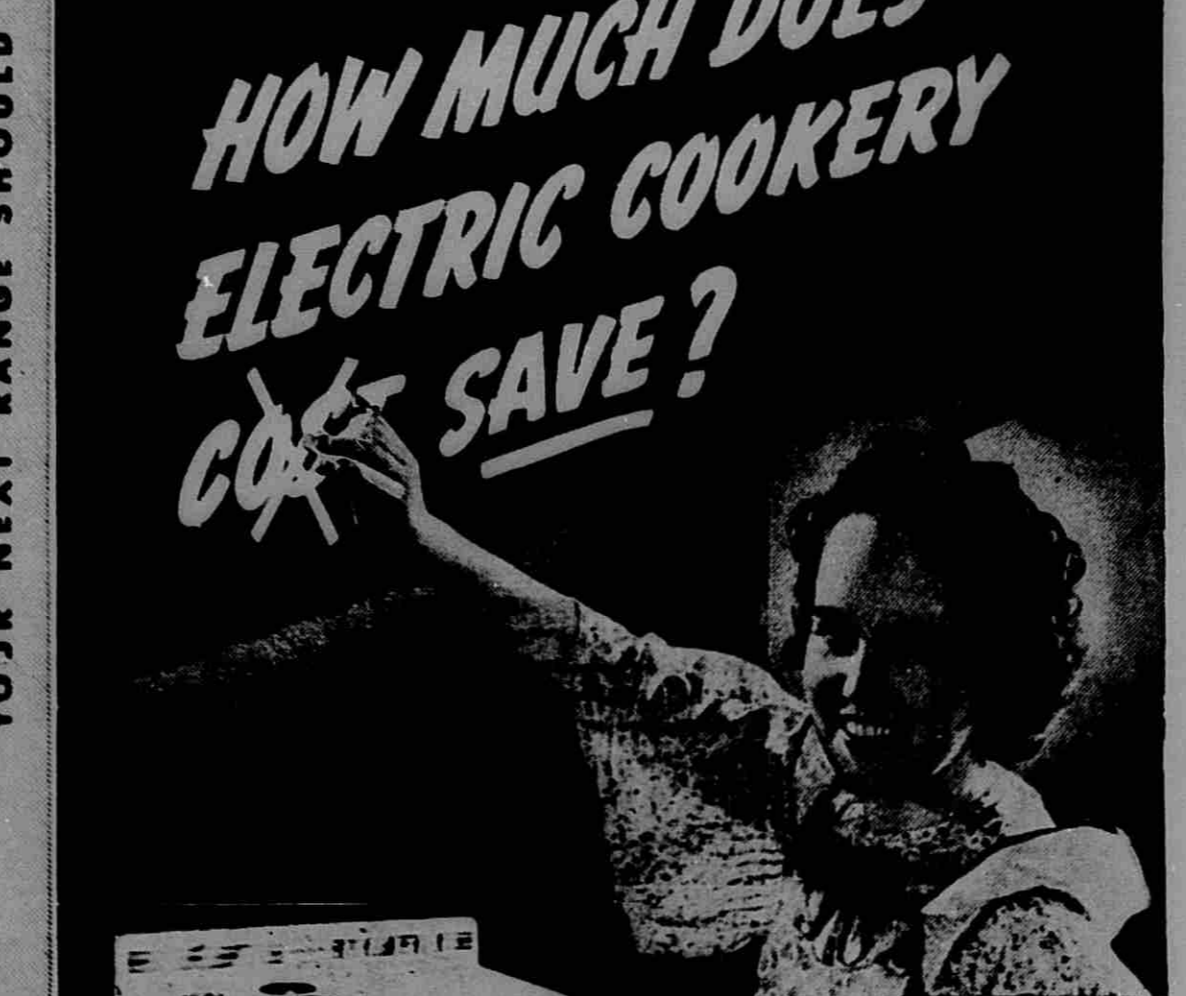

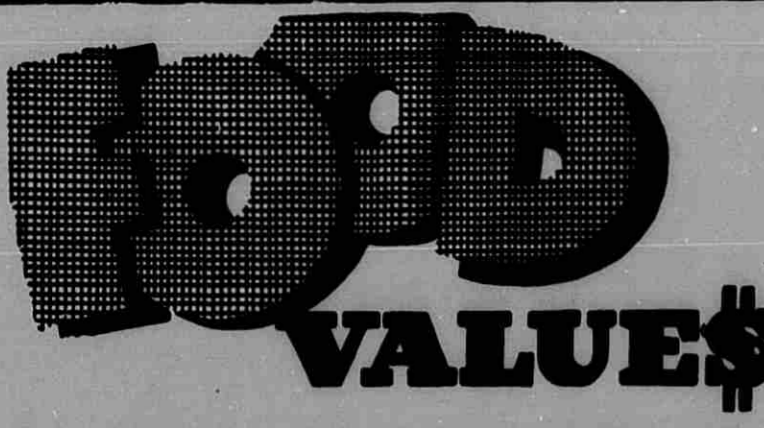

Water In Alfalfa May Rot Silage

Water in grass intended for silage offers Michigan farmers interested in this new system of conserving feed crops a chance to prove their guessing ability. Despite a warning broadcast nationally that the extra moisture may cause silos to collapse, C. F. Huffman, dairy nutrition research professor at Michigan State College, sees other angles more important to the problem.

Increased interest in making grass silage results from frequent unsuitable weather during haying time for first cuttings. This indicates that cutting grass for silage when fairly mature obtains the approximately suitable moisture percentage, lessening likelihood of spoilage.

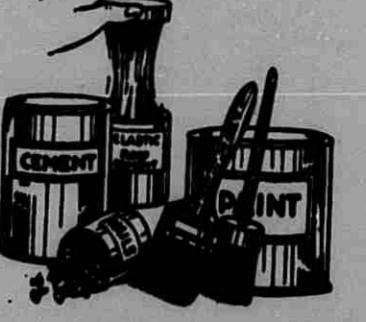

Week's Best Recipe
Baked Oranges: 4 seedless oranges, 1 cup white corn syrup, 2 cups sugar, 2 cups water. Grate oranges slightly to break oil cells in rind. Cook in boiling water 30 minutes until tender. Drain. Cut in halves. Mix syrup, sugar and water and cook five minutes. Pour syrup over oranges placed in casserole. Cover and bake at 350 degrees 1 1/2 hours.

Renew It!
If your linoleum shows signs of age, try painting it and stippling it. Before doing so remove old wax and grease with gasoline. Open all windows while doing this work. Use floor enamel or paint. Put on two coats. Stippling keeps a plain color from showing the soil. Stipple by using a sponge with flat surface. Take a board and put stippling color on it. Press sponge on stippling color and then on floor. This transfers pattern of sponge from board to floor.

Make Them
Cut a strip of olecloth of colorful patterns if you desire that or plain color if you prefer and make strip of size of your old shades. Attach olecloth to old rollers. Make a hem large enough for stick and fasten the curtain pulls. This makes a change for your kitchen and gives a pleasing color to your work room.

Household Hints:
Length of chain is handy for stringing coat hangers when airing clothes. Coat hangers may be placed as far apart as desired on chain without sliding together. A little starch in rinsing water for curtains will make them easier to iron and cause them to stay in place better. When cooking vegetables with a strong odor, cover vegetable with boiling water on top of which place the "heel" of a loaf of bread. Bread absorbs much of the odor. If soup is too salty add a raw potato and let soup boil for a few minutes. Potato absorbs much of the salt. When frying fish, first soak in milk, then dip in flour. This gives a golden crust to it.
