





GRAND RAPIDS

(By K. K. Vining)

Driving home the other night rom a meeting we couldn't help but notice the appearance of farm homes since electricity came to Kent County farmers. Homes were brightly lighted. Here and there a yard light high up on a windmill derrick, or barn, made the yard about as bright as day. The whole country side seemed cheerier for the bright lights in the farm homes. In preparing our annual report a year ago we checked up on power line service in this county. We found that 4100 farms had power. This is about 73% of Kent County farms. There were over 800 miles of line. Service is furnished by the Consumers Power Company, Lowell Municipal Power Plant and R. E. A. lines.

Last summer on our landscape tour George Dinkle of Sparta township was asked how much the landscape work had added to the value of his farmstead. Said he wasn't sure of the value but he knew one thing. Money couldn't buy the pleasure he and his wife had derived from making the planting and in watching it develop and grow. They were folks who had taken their planting plan made by O. I. Gregg, extension specialist from Michigan State College, and followed it out to the letter. This home is one of many that have been made in Kent County and which have given pleasure to a good many homes.

4-H Clubs received some more recognition lately when Congress passed legislation which was signed by the President prohibiting the unauthorized use of the 4-H Club emblem. This emblem, a 4 leaf clover with an "H" on each leaf is a sign of the 4-H Club organization.
