Home rule for administration of relief, authorized by the 1939 state legislature as part of an "economy" program, is coming home to roost in more than 80 counties this week.

During the last gubernatorial campaign supervisors urged defeat of the 1937 welfare act. They insisted that a centralized system of providing relief to jobless and unemployed was fodder for a highly trained social worker, yet was a luxury that Michigan could not afford.

The 1937 welfare act was defeated, and the problem was thrown into the laps of 1939 legislators. A new law was enacted whereby handling of relief was returned to counties. The state pledged to match local payments, dollar for dollar.

Relief has become "big business" in America today. Expenditures for the poor once were nominal. The word "poor" was associated with "charity," vanished upon the advent of the Great Depression which swallowed millions of workers into idleness.
