PERSONAL QUALITIES

BAYLOR university at Waco, Texas, keeps a confidential file in which estimates are recorded of the personal qualities of students. Honesty, initiative, reliability, personality, emotional stability and capacity to co-operate are points which are considered when employers want information about a student.

Young people often rise or fall more because they have or have not these good qualities, than because of any successes or failures they make in their studies. If people go up in the air on frequent occasions, if they can't co-operate with their fellow workers, they have very serious faults. People who can succeed only if they play a lone hand don't seem to go very well in a world that asks for team work.
