### Poultry and Beans

Other food products which require inspection by the state in the interest of both the producer and the consumer are poultry produc and beans. Poultry products alone were responsible for an added \$6,000 ,while another \$6,000 is expenditures for inspection of beans due to demands for grad-ing of large quantities of colored beans expected on the basis of present

In a discussion of inspection payrells Commissioner Beamer pointed out the department at-tempted to provide this inspection service upon an actual cost basis with the producers and processors

with the producers and processors sharing the cost.

The apple commission, from taxes collected from apple growers, reimburses the state department for the cost of apple inspectors who are deputized by the commission to act in its behalf. The amount of money necessary for payment of this inspection staff is advanced to the department monthly.

Approximately \$4,000 in the department's payroll increase will be shown as a result of the newly effective farm produce storage,

fective farm produce storage, which is operated upon a fee basis, with fees returnable to the depart-ment to make the service selfustaining.

### Milk Producers Gain As a result of the 1939 milk ma

keting act, Michigan milk farmer producers are \$527,000 ahead in inne for the year.

This amount represents the increase in price granted to producers on 177,000,000 pounds of milk since Sept. 1. In southern Michigan, for example, prices which ranged from \$1.50 to \$2.45 per hundredweight have been stabilized. Of the increased producer income, \$496,600 went to producers in the Detroit milk area; \$7.800 to Muskeson area producers: \$7,800 to Muskegon area producers; \$8,000 to Ann Arbor and \$25,000 to Grand Rapids producers, the lat-ter increases being made volun-tarily by distributors.
