Cotton Stamps Available Soon Follows Plan Similar to Food Stamps

Kent County was recently designated by Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard, for installation of the Cotton Stamp Plan through the functions of the Surplus Marketing Administration.

Reaction to Food Stamp Plan

The Cotton Stamp Plan will mean approximately \$250,000 annually in additional business to eligible participants in the plan.

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Supplements Other Projects

It was emphasized that the Cotton Stamp Plan would in no way interfere with present operations of the W. P. A. Sewing Room Projects, but it is designed to supplement such projects and move additional quantities of cotton goods so that consumption will be increased.

Many Kent Roads To Be Improved Biggest in Mileage for Any One Year

"Where and how do county highways fit into the national defense program?" This question is being answered by the Kent county road commission in the 1940-41 road improvement program, according to Otto S. Hess, engineer and manager of the commission.

Parallels Routes

"The new Walker-rd., through Walker, Alpine, Sparta and Tyrone townships," Hess said, "will be completed in another year or so and is another very important defense road; it parallels M31. The 1940 county highway construction program was one of the largest, from the standpoint of miles completed, in the history of the county."
