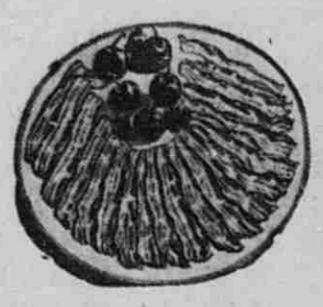

There will be men there who can help fill out the blanks. March 15 is the last date for filing returns and as a last suggestion don't put it off until the last day.
