# Wet Corn in Crib A Seed Headache

Planting Michigan's 1941 crop of orn for grain and silage may turn nto a headache unless farmers sure their present supplies enough quality

Too much of Michigan's corn went into the crib last fall with too high a moisture content, in the opinion of A. A. Johnson, farm crops specialist on the staff of Michigan State College. Samples and tests taken from various farm cribs convince him that ordinary seed supplies may not suffice this

He collected samples in Janu-ary and February. The moisture content ranged from 18 to 35 per cent. These samples germinate from 40 to 85 per cent. Corn that was still in the field and caught in the cold spell that occurred November germinated 50 per cent or less. Not only was much of the corn comparatively high in moisture at ibbing time, but the winter months have not been dry enough to draw out this excess water. In some southern counties where corn went into the crib at 23 to 24 per cent moisture, that same corn ha even taken on moisture and is up to 25 to 26 per cent water. Two lessone can be taken from he situation now apparent, ac cording to Johnson. One is that

some of the open pollinated vareties and some of the hybrids were not adapted, another lesson is that they were not low enough in moisture when cribbed. Low tempera sharply reduce germinat when moisture is above 20 pe ent. For seed the open polli corn likely will be low in germination. For feed, any of this corn may mold when warm weather re turns to the state.

Farmers, he says, should make tests. They should nave field selected and properly ured their seed corn last fall Now he best step is to test and if not atisfactory, to obtain seed that will give sufficient germination for a proper stand of corn in 1941.
