





Save Surpluses For the Future

Always a busy canning time, mid-August should be busier than ever this year, say members of the Michigan State College home economics extension service. They point to a nation-wide campaign to save food for future emergency needs.

The government has urged every community in the country to save surplus vegetables and fruits. This food may be distributed later in the community, particularly through school-lunch programs.

Whether canning is done on a large or small scale, a steam-pressure can-ner is a recommended piece of equipment if there are non-acid vegetables to be processed: Only by the use of pressure is it possible to get the high temperature needed to kill organisms in non-acid vegekill organisms in non-acid vege-tables that, if not destroyed, are liable to cause spoilage. Practically all vegetables but tomatoes are in

the non-acid class.

In many gardens, snap beans, young and tender lima beans, green table soybeans and corn are available soybeans. able now in quantities for canning All may be put up safely in tin cans or glas: jars in the steam-pressure canner. Tomatoes, also available now, may be put up in jars or cans
