Income Tax Facts (Editor's Note: -Below will be found the latest news articles dealing with the filing of income tax returns. It is suggested that each article be carefully read and saved for future reference.)

Fifth Article Many farmers will be liable for filing income tax returns in the year of tax for the first time this year. The term "farmers" includes livestock raisers, fruit and nut growers, and operators of plantations on either death receipts and disbursements basis or on the accrual basis of accounting. A constant method must, however, be employed if a cash basis is used.
