Glider Pilots for Uncle Sam's Army

Gliding which has been the sport of many adventurous young men in America is something which Uncle Sam is now going to use to help win the war. According to Captain George F. Samsen, in charge of the District Air Corps Recruiting Office in Grand Rapids, glider pilot training is now available to men between the ages of 18 and 35 who want to fly but are unable to qualify as aviation cadets. It is an ideal opportunity for men above the aviation cadet age of 26 years.

Glider pilot training includes instruction in flying a light plane. The glider training includes gliding in all phases of the type that have broken all national distance and altitude records. These planes can sail hundreds of miles across the country and reach altitudes up to 20,000 feet. It was in one of these types of gliders that a glider pilot at Frankfort, Michigan, recently glided across Lake Michigan. Training will also include the use of operative type gliders, with emphasis on airplane towing, formation and night flying. The glider schools are located in exceptionally attractive places: at Wickenburg, Arizona (near Phoenix), at Twenty-nine Palms, California (near Palm Springs), at Elmira, New York (in the famous Finger Lakes region) and at Lamesa, Texas (near San Angelo).

Upon completion of glider training all those who graduate will be rated as staff sergeants on flying status and will receive pay of \$108 per month. Pending legislation may soon raise this pay to \$144 per month.

Men who are interested are invited to visit the District Air Corps Recruiting Office, Army Ordnance and Michigan, Grand Rapids, Mich., where complete information is available.

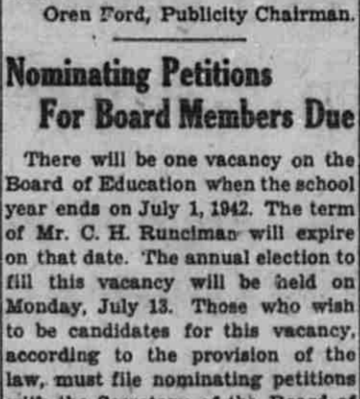
