#### Fuel Oil Ration Pledges Must Be Paid

Just like a promissory note for a bank loan, fuel oil pledges must be paid in ration coupons.

During the early part of the

heating season, before the ration oupons were distributed, oil suppliers were permitted to accept the consumer's note or pledge agree ment to surrender sufficient fuel oil ration coupons when received, of values equal to the indebtedness It has come to the attention of the authorities that some consumers have not turned in the coupons they owe to their supplier. Fuel oil suppliers are required by law to report those who have failed to redeem their pledges. The rationing suthorities suggest that all users of fuel oil who have outstanding pledges, redeem them at once, as they must of necessity take necessary steps for their redemption. Failure to do so makes them liable for cancellation of their entire ration, or a possible deduction from next year's
