Winter Concrete Aids News Helps Farmers

Almost any average winter day can be used for placing concrete for a barn floor, a feeding floor for hogs or in chicken houses, according to agricultural engineers.

When the concrete is set and the summer demands for labor will repay any time spent in setting a properly placed concrete.

Water or gravel need not be heated if the temperature is above 40 degrees. Concrete laid in winter, however, should get a protective covering of straw or hay for at least 48 hours to keep out frost.

When the concrete is poured the temperature of the mix should be between 70 and 80 degrees. Too hot or too cold will result in cracking.

Outdoor concreting in fair weather or early spring is simplified if the grade is prepared in mid-winter. Further information can be obtained from the agricultural engineering department at Michigan State College.

Water is being heated by kindling on a fire under an old metal oil barrel. Water can also be heated in large kettles.

New concrete foundations are protected against freezing by covering with waterproof building paper and then with hay and straw.
