



There are some things you can do to your seed. Green sprouting is a good practice. When danger of frost is past spread your seed stock out on the barn floor or in an unused hay mow. The spuds, of course, will sprout but the light will harden them off. The size and firmness of the sprout will indicate the vitality of the seed. Don't break the sprout off.
