



Salute to the Flag

A congressional resolution, adopt ted on December 22, 1942, changes the procedure for pledging allegiance to the flag. The statement, "I pledge allegiance . . ." is now randered by standing with right hand over the heart. The resolution adds: ". . . clvilians will always show full respect to the flag when the pledge is given by merely standing at attention, men removing the headdress."
