Rural Fire Fighters Improved community organizaare making the program to reduce rural fire loss in New York state one of the most effective in the nation. Since January, 1938, the num ber of rural fire districts in the state has increased from 106 to 312. A number of others have probably been formed but have not yet been classified for insurance rate pur poses. The state fire-district law enables rural communities to ge better protection by permitting them to finance fire fighting equipmen

with public funds. Volunteer firemen's associations have helped to make the many district organizations possible.

Wise Seed Use Occasionally a home gardener feels that he has a poor stand of plants in his garden because he did not use enough seed. If he used old seed of low germinating power, this may be true; but usually the weather or some other condition has prevented the seedling plants from getthickly than otherwise. This involves and pick it. extra work in thinning out extra plants; or in many gardens, it means that the plants stay crowded and never produce as much food as they might.

In buying seed, it is wise to plan the amount of seed needed for the space to be planted. The seeding rates suggested in seed catalogues or other booklets on gardening give a good margin of safety.
