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Kent FFA Groups In Prize Contest

Kent county's five Future Farmers of America chapters are eligible to compete this year in a statewide contest designed to stimulate cooperation and other chapter activities.



The contest is being conducted by the Michigan Association of FFA under the supervision of the State Board of Control for Vocational Education and in cooperation with the A. & P. Tea Company, which is supplying cash awards totaling \$425 and plaques of merit for the fifteen leading chapters of the state.

The purpose of the contest is to stimulate the activities of local chapters in supervised farm practice, cooperation, community service, leadership, earnings and savings, conduct of meetings, scholarship and recreation.

The awards will consist of \$50 and a gold FFA plaque to each of five "top" award chapters; \$25 and a silver plaque to each of five "second" award chapters; and \$10 and a bronze plaque to each of five "third" award chapters.

Application blanks will be forwarded to all chapters by November, the state advisor added, but he urged local groups to start their program now with this contest in mind instead of waiting for blanks to arrive.

Charley Bell and His Tall Stories Chopped Off Frozen Arm 54 Years Ago; Grows 12-ft. Tomato Vines

"Charley Bell is your man," said Fred Felth, editor of the Diamond Drill. And so we engaged him for the job. "How many quarts of blueberries do you want?" asked Charley.
