Or Slaughtering Meats

The War Food Administration has announced that an individual may slaughter livestock for home consumption without benefit of a license or permit if he is entitled to consume the meat noint-free

OPA says a person may consume meat without giving up ration points only if (1) the meat was produced from livestock raised from birth on the farm or premises he operates. (2) the livestock was raised for at least 60 days immediately preceding slaughter on premises that he operates, or (3) the livestock was raised for a period during which its weight was increased by at Jrest 35 per cent on premises which he operates. To be eligible to slaughter and

consume meat point-free (1) a per-

son must have resided more than six months of each year on the farm he operates, or (2) he must have visited the farm to give personal attention and supervision to let employes on his farm consume

Sudan grass sown at this time of year makes rapid growth and will soon establish itself sufficiently to hold the soil in the waterway. I early fall the sudan should I mowed for hay and a mixture of equal parts of timothy and redtop sown at the rate of 30 pounds an acre. 


