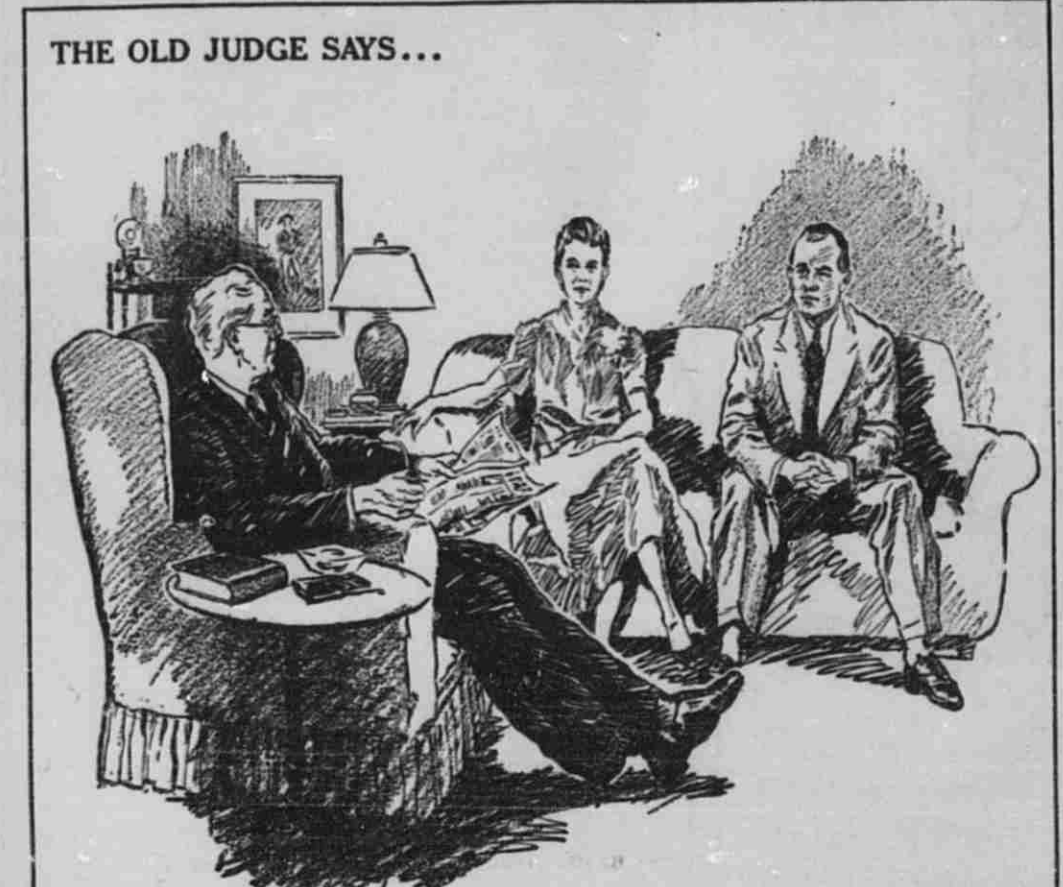

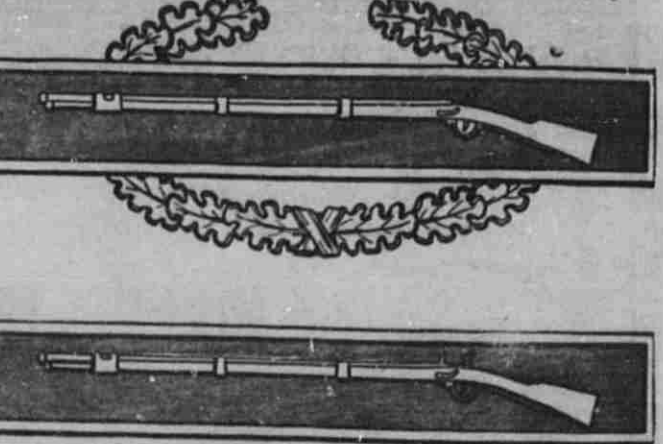

NEW BADGES FOR AMERICAN DOUGHBOY—U. S. Army Infantrymen who achieve a stipulated standard of proficiency will now receive a new award, the Expert Infantryman Badge. The design depicted in the accompanying illustration (lower) is a miniature silver musket mounted on an infantry blue field with silver border. For awards whose conduct in combat is exemplary, or whose combat action occurs in a major operation, the Combat Infantryman Badge will be awarded. It is similar to the former except that it is superimposed on an elliptical wreath (upper). When 65 percent of the badge of an infantry unit is either of the awards the unit guidon, the badge will be worn above the left breast pocket in the same position as the wings of an airman.
