Band members are selling tickets by selling stamps and bonds which will be given to ticket holders at the concert, or delivered if the holder of the ticket is unable to attend.

Anyone wishing to attend the concert who has not as yet bought bonds or stamps may do so by buying them at the auditorium door by 8 p. m. Tuesday, February 8.

It has been hoped that the band, which is handling the 4th War Loan Drive for Lowell until the concert, could relieve the "Gallants" of having to solicit additional sales to reach Lowell's quota of \$125,000.

UP and DOWN

Farmers' Institute Meetings. If you live in the Lowell and Caledonia areas your local paper will carry a story about the Farmers' Institute meetings being held next week.

These are two of five such meetings in February. Others are scheduled for Rockford on February 16, Byron Center on February 24, and Cedar Springs on February 29. Designed as educational meetings for the whole family with a program to stimulate war food production.

There will be talks, discussions, demonstrations, and exhibits. Each meeting will have some outstanding farm leader in Michigan as a speaker.

Checking Days Next Week. Farm account books in Kent County will be checked next week Monday and Tuesday.

The number of farm account operators hasn't increased in Kent County of late due to extension war activities but of the many folks buying account books there might be some who would care to cooperate with the farm management department at Michigan State College in this work.

The Seed Situation. An interesting letter comes from A. A. Johnson, of the farm crops department at Michigan State College, in regard to seed supplies for this coming season.

The Farm Crops Department has made an intensive survey of the seed situation. They find that if available stocks of oat seed are used the supply will be ample in nearly every area.

Barley seed is scarce and all available local barley should be used for seed purposes. Barley, the same as oats, should be cleaned and treated.

Alfalfa seed supplies are scarce and that available not too hard but there is no other supply. Under these conditions Johnson advises that broom grass be added to all alfalfa plantings.

Sources of good hybrid seed are plentiful and of good quality but advance information indicates the demand is heavy. Many growers are shifting to hybrid seed this year for the first time.
