

Potato Seed Cutting Made Easy



Three million bushels of seed potatoes will be used in 1944 to plant Michigan's commercial and home garden potato fields and plots. This simple device can take the drudgery out of the job where considerable seed is to be cut. Usual methods with a jack knife permit a fast worker to cut 25 bushels in a day. E. J. Wheeler, Michigan State College potato specialist, can cut up that many bushels in about two hours with the device illustrated above. Both hands pull seed tubers toward the stationary knife. Seed pieces drop into a crate. Gloves are worn until the operator attains skill. The rope on the slanted table holds potatoes back from the knife.




