



To Moisten Cigarettes Spokesmen for the cigarette makers offer these ways ir. which a dry cigarette can be moistened by the

Gently blow through the cigarette fingers. from both ends before it is lighted. The tobacco will capture much of the moisture exnaled through it: For an extremely dry cigaretta. moisten one end and then reverse and light the moistened end. Your first puff will draw the moisture

through the tobacco. Don't tap cigarettes or roll the between the palms of your hands, for these practices loosen the tobacco and contribute nothing to smoking pleasure.

Keep cigarettes at their freshes by unwrapping the top of the pack-age when opening, and keeping the fold closed at other times.

Canning Demands Cleanliners The woman who has always sanned food knows she must guard cleanliness all along the line, because all her efforts may be wasted if she neglects this essential detail. Spotless jars and closures are vital necessities to successful canning. Whether they are brand new or have been used over a period of years, all jars and tops must be washed thor- California, he saw a man-eating oughly with soapy water, rinsed in shark. clear water, and boiled for 10 min-This complete washing must never be omitted.

Before starting any canning or preserving, make sure that the kitchen or work space is immaculate. Have the preserving pots clean and ready. Provide adequate cans or papers to catch parings, pits, or other parts of the produce that are removed. Wash the hands thoroughly with soap and water before beginning the task, paying particular attention to the area under the nails. A scrubbing brush should be used to reach every bit of dirt that may be under the nails. Wear a washable housedress and a good-sized apron.
