Thanksgiving Day will be observed November 23 in Michigan. Conjecture concerning the probable date was put to an official end with receipt by the county clerk's office of a message from Governor Kelly's administrative assistant that the fourth Thursday of November would be the legal date for observance of the holiday. That is the date set by congress.

The necessity of a well drawn-up zoning ordinance is becoming more and more apparent in Lowell. Wherever people live closely in towns or cities, some consideration must be given to the fellow next door and to all the other people in the neighborhood or block. Construction mistakes, once made, are difficult and expensive to correct. The smart thing to do is to avoid them.

Petitions have been in circulation here this week asking the Common Council to refrain from disposing of the parking space on N. Monroe-ave. now owned by the village of Lowell. The petition also requests the Common Council to secure additional parking space. It is also understood that a number of citizens will appear before the Council next Monday night regarding the matter.

Just because it has been announced that War Bonds are cashable like checks at your bank, is no reason to convert them into spending money. The reason for this announcement is so that, in real necessity, your bonds can be like a check, instantly cashable, no waiting. This is more reason why they should be held, since you are assured you can get your money at once if you have to. Remember, you lose good interest when you cash bonds, money made for you without effort. Interest counts up. If you don't believe it, try paying it. Hold on to your bonds. You are not helping the war if you cash them.

With ten million men out of the country, in camps and aboard ships and on the fighting fronts, there is still a tremendous shortage of places to live. Families right here in Lowell wait months for a decent home. Does this suggest that this town needs 50 new homes? We believe it does. It also suggests that the normal growth of Lowell will take it above the 2,250 mark in the post war period. More people, more homes, more apartments, more school rooms, more cars, more refrigerators, and a thousand other things are and will be needed. Such needs are real and the problem of satisfying them is real. Who will provide all these needs? Will you help? It is worth thinking about right now.

Up and Down Kent County Roads

By K. K. Vining, Kent County Agricultural Agent

To our desk the other day came a "Discussion Leaders' Guide" from the Michigan State Farm Bureau for the use and guidance of community farm bureaus. The coming winter the theme of discussion group will be "Where Are We Going?"

We have watched with interest the development of the leader discussions, a source of programs for any kind of a farm organization. We like the idea for the reason that it gives the member of the Grange, community club, or local farm bureau, a chance to be on the program, and the big thing we like about it is the fact that it develops leadership in the group.

Clarence Mullet, County Agent in Newaygo County, tells me that all the community farm bureaus in his county use this method for their programs, never depending on outside speakers. Gerald Kitson, lecturer of Kent County Pomona Grange, has had a session of the lecturers of the local granges with Claud Nash, from Michigan State College, to discuss the procedure for discussion groups.

In some farm organizations the discussion group method cannot always be used but there is a place for it on many programs. Every farm organization that has an educational program has hidden talent in the membership. The discussion group will bring it out.

Eugene Smaltz, of the State Farm Bureau, is to be commended on the excellent book he has prepared for the coming season's discussions.

Fire prevention is still a topic for good discussion and it could be used for a discussion group.

What have been the cause of fires in this county since record keeping started in November 1942? In dwellings 23 percent have been due to defective chimneys; 16 percent on roofs; 15 percent overheated furnaces and stoves. Defective wiring, exploding stoves and unknown factors were causes for the balance.

Grass fires not under control caused 30% of fires to farm buildings. Brooder stoves caused 7%; and spontaneous combustion 10%. Lanterns, lightning and unknown causes contributed to the balance.

Kent County's rural area has good fire protection, much the envy of other counties.

Percy J. Read Dies From Crash

Entire Community Shocked By Untimely Death of Lifelong Citizen

Percy J. Read a lifelong and highly esteemed citizen of this community, died early Tuesday morning in Mercy hospital, Cadillac, from injuries suffered an hour and a half earlier when his car left the road north of Manton on US-131 and rolled over. Mr. Read was returning from a business trip when the accident occurred, and was alone in the car.

Death came to Mr. Read on his 54th birthday. His untimely passing has removed a gentleman of unimpeachable character, one who had devoted upwards of thirty years of his life in the services of his native township of Vergennes. Mr. Read became Justice of the Peace directly after his 21st birthday, and during successive years he was supervisor, board of review member, constable, highway commissioner, and township clerk, and was also a member of the rural school board.

In the fall of 1937 he organized the implement business in Lowell under the firm name of Percy J. Read & Sons. He served as president of the Grand Rapids Milk Producers Association from 1939 to 1941, and just recently had purchased the Richmond Cafe in Lowell which he was operating at the time of his death under the name of the Lowell Cafe.

Mr. Read was born October 10, 1890 in Vergennes-twp., the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas W. Read. On August 30, 1912 he married Ethel V. Mungerson of Merne, Mich., who survives him. Remaining also to mourn their loss are his parents, a son, Sgt. William Read, now overseas, and three daughters, Mrs. Frank Baker, Mrs. Louis Oesch and Gertrude, all of Lowell. Another son, Tech. 5 James Read, was drowned in the S. Pacific in 1942. He leaves also, one brother, Charles of Flint, a sister Mrs. Emma Titus of Penn Yan, N. Y., and four grandsons.

Mr. Read was a member of Lowell Rotary, Lowell Oddfellow lodge and Lowell Masonic lodge.

The body will repose in the Baker home until noon Friday, when it will be taken to the Congregational church to lie in state until two o'clock, the hour for funeral services, which will be under the auspices of Lowell Lodge, No. 90, F. & A. M. The officiating clergyman will be Rev. N. G. Woon, pastor. Burial will be in the Alton cemetery.

Lowell Boy Hero in Skirmish in Italy

Sgt. Lloyd Frost of Lowell and four buddies of the 88th infantry unit recently stormed a house on the 5th army front in Italy and knocked out a German observation post holding up the advance of their rifle company.

Frost's company was pinned down by artillery and mortar fire near San Miniato. Volunteering to knock out the OP directing the fire, he and his four comrades worked their way to the building and opened fire. A Nazi captain and another German were wounded and three others surrendered.

With the obstacle removed, the rifle company advanced and took its objective.

Frost is serving with the 349th infantry. His father, Byron Frost, lives seven miles north of Lowell.

Sergt. Glendon Swarthout Describes Scenes in France While Serving With 5th Army

Sergeant Glendon Swarthout, a graduate of Lowell high school, who has been in service overseas in Africa, Italy and France, writes an interesting letter under date of September 6, 1944, in which he describes the happiness of the French people over the arrival of the Americans. Glendon's whole 3rd Infantry Division of the Fifth army was transferred to General Patch and spearheaded the southern invasion of France. At the time this letter was written, Glendon was in sight of the foothills of the Alps near the Belfort Gap, since which time he has received a back injury and is now in a hospital somewhere in Italy. The letter follows:

Banks May Now Cash War Bonds

Bond holders are advised to keep bonds unless cash is necessary.

Beginning October 2, banks have been authorized to cash government war bonds. This provision has been made by the U. S. Treasury Department, for the convenience of people, who, because of circumstances beyond their control, are forced to cash their securities.

It is not the intent of the government to encourage cashing bonds, but rather to make it possible to hold bonds until the last possible minute if emergency makes it necessary to cash them at all. The new plan is to encourage people to put more savings into War Bonds since they are now as negotiable as a government check.

There are several rigid requirements which bond owners will have to observe to take advantage of this new service.

- 1—There will have to be positive identification of the owner of the bond. Banks will not cash bonds for strangers nor for anyone about whom there is any doubt of identification.
- 2—The owner of the bond, or bonds, must appear in person. Banks are not allowed to cash bonds sent in by another person, or agent.
- 3—Before cashing, bonds must be endorsed. The endorsement MUST be made in the presence of the banker who exchanges cash for the bond. DO NOT put the endorsement on the bond prior to bringing it to the bank.
- 4—Banks cannot cash bonds which have been torn or defaced.
- 5—No bonds can be cashed before 60 days after the date of issue.
- 6—All issues of bonds are eligible for cash at any authorized bank, including A. B. C. D. and E issues. Bankers will determine the value of the bonds and accrued interest from a table furnished monthly by the U. S. Treasury Department which conforms to the printed schedule on the bond itself.

The cashing of bonds will be made at no expense to the bond holder, this expense being absorbed by the U. S. Treasury Department.

Kisses and Tears

"I guess I've been kissed by several hundred women in France so far, old and young, handsome and ugly. But don't be jealous. It's the French kiss on one cheek then on the other. One old lady as old and small as my grandmother ripped my shirt sleeve as I rode up in a jeep, simply because she didn't want to let me go. When you stand among them, tears come in their eyes sometimes as they tell you 'We have waited so long for you to come! Five years we had waited! First we heard you had landed, then you were at Aix-en-Provence, then Avignon, then Montelimar,—then we heard—they're only forty kilometers, then thirty, then we heard your big guns, and Oh, then—then you came.' It is hard to keep back the tears yourself sometimes. I have slept some nights sharing my blankets with men as old as your Dad and mine, men with graying hair, who have taken rifles from the Germans and now fight as Maquis alongside the Americans. And young women too. And boys of 14 and 15.

"Sometimes we may wonder why we are separated, if it is worth the cost in longing and hunger and pain. If you could see the looks in the eyes of the Frenchmen and women, boys and girls you might suddenly know. We have known these things for a year. These people have known equal agony for over four years. I used to say—I hate Europe. I don't care if they all kill themselves over there, so long as I am not asked to go over. I am wiser now. These people are as fine and honest and sturdy, and often wiser, than my own. They have a keener sense of humor, and are much more realistic about things like sex and birth and other subjects prishish Mid-Westerners try to pretend do not exist. You feel here is the Motherland. America may be the Fatherland. But here, in Europe, was the cradle in which our ancestors rocked, and there comes a sort of reverence which cannot be denied."

Pfc. Clifford Guild Killed in Action

The sad news has been received here of the death of another Lowell boy, Pfc. Clifford E. Guild, U. S. M. C. R., who was serving with the Marines somewhere in the Pacific area.

News of Clifford's death was received by his father, Herman Guild, Wednesday evening, Oct. 4, from A. A. Vandergrift, Lt. Gen. U. S. M. C., commandant of the Marine Corps. The message stated that Clifford "was killed in action in the performance of his duty and service of his country. No information is available at the present regarding burial of remains, temporarily buried in locality where death occurred. To prevent passing aid to our enemies, do not divulge the name of his ship or station. Please accept our sympathy."

Clifford would have been 23 on the second of next January. He graduated from Lowell with the class of 1940, worked for a year at the Ford automobile plant in Detroit, then enlisted in the Marines, leaving for service Sept. 15, 1941.

Besides the father, he is survived by a brother, Homer; one sister, Mrs. Helen Bailey of Grand Rapids, and two other brothers also in the Marines, Pfc. Leroy and Pfc. Stanley, both overseas.
