

KELLY RE-ELECTED

Incomplete returns from Tuesday's general election show conclusively that Franklin D. Rooseveit has been elected to a fourth term as president of the United States. At this writing (Wednesday afternoon) many thousands of votes are yet to be tabulated, nevertheless returns show that Roosevelt has carried as many as thirty four of the states, with Dewey ahead in fourteen states. Roosevelt was strong in Detroit and other great industrial centers. Dewey's strength was nainly in the smaller cities and towns and the agricultural areas. Although complete returns may show Michigan in the Roosevelt

olumn, the Roosevelt ballot strength was apparently not being felt by the Democratic state ticket. The Republican state ticket was showing lesser but comfortable leads over their opponents.

Returns indicate that the Democratic party will have control of the House of Representatives and that they have also gained a seat or two in the U. S. Senate.

Congressman Bartel J. Jonkman of the Fifth district, comprising Kent and Ottawa counties, won his third election to Congress, defeating J. Neal Lamoreaux. Complete returns will doubtless give Jonkman a majority of 12,000 or more in the district.






