State Police and Sheriff's Department Launch Search For Fire Bug; Loss Estimated at Near \$200,000; Insurance Totals \$98,500, Which Is All That Could Be Carried on the Property

Investigations under way since Sunday, have convinced authorities that the disastrous fire which swept through the Lowell high school building early Sunday morning had been set.

State Police Sgt. Quentin Dean, in charge of arson investigations for the Rockford post, spent part of Sunday and Monday probing the rulns in overalls, and turned his findings over to the state laboratory in Lansing on Tuesday. He was accompanied to Lansing by Supt. W. W. Gumser.

. State police and the sheriff's department have launched a search for a fire bug in the community. Sheriff Hugh M. Blacklock assigned Deputies John Sayers, Al Renis and Lowell Deputy Frank L. Stephens to assist Dean.

Building Nearly a Total Loss

The fire which had evidently burned for quite some time unnoticed, gutted the interior of the building, leaving three-fourths of the structure in utter ruins. The loss is estimated at between \$150,000 and \$200-000. The property was insured for \$98,500, which is all that could be carried. \$12,500 of this was on equipment.

The three-story brick building was erected in 1915 at a cost of \$50,000. but many improvements and changes had been made through the years, and it could not now be replaced for several times that amount. Its loss during these critical times is a real catastrophe for

Plans for getting the high school under way are still indefinite, and it may be a couple of weeks at least. All available buildings are under consideration but must be approved by the State Fire Marshall and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, according to C. E Runciman, president of the Board of Education.

Mr. Runciman also states that estimates have been requested to rebuilding through the State Department of Public Instruction and the State Fire Marshall's office.

### Sidelights on the Fire

The fire was reported shortly before 8:30 by Mrs. George Fonger, Lafavette-st.

A number of nearby residents reported smelling smoke in the vicinity earlier, but had found nothing to alarm them, so the fire gained considerable headway before being discovered.

A fortunate thing in connection with the fire is that all records in the superintendent's office were saved.

Everybody will be happy to know that the old bell, which has been calling children to school for nearly 70 years, was undamaged by the fire, so that it can still ring forth its old familiar peal through future

All of the school's typewriters, about 18 in number, were carried to safety, although some were damaged.

The old gag about the "kids" being overjoyed at seeing the schoolouse burn down, has been proved wrong. Their sorrow is real. Not one, but what wishes it back. The place held memories.

At least one high school girl turned out in pajamas, slippers and hair curiers to watch the excitement-and had her picture taken by some camera fan, a stranger. Musical instruments valued at over a thousand dollars were carried

from the burning building by Orval Jessup, music instructor, one of the first to reach the scene. Band uniforms were at the homes of the individual members, so consequently escaped damage.

Students rescued the emblematic spade and school trophies which lined the halls. Framed pictures of all the old high school grads hung around the walls of the senior session room and were lost Byrd Beachum, head of the shop department, suffered a persona

oss that cannot be measured in dollars and cents, losing many years' accumulation of drawings, blue prints and other valuable papers, also many personally-owned tools.

A sixth grader was observed with an armful of books, and when asked if he ran into the fire to save his books, he replied, 'Fleck, no! I brought these from home to throw in."

The members of the school board at the time of the building of the Notice to Pupils school, burned Sunday, were D. G. Look, W. S. Winegar, Dr. F. E. White, R. VanDyke and E. D. McQueen. The proposal to build, was twice voted down by the district before finally carrying. It was first occupied on February 7, 1916, and dedication ceremonies held March

The final payment on the mortgage on the burned building was paid March 1, 1941, the event being celebrated later by the burning of the mortgage and an appropriate program, at which the address was given by A. F. Frazee, first superintendent of the new school. Sunt. Gumser estimates the number of graduates from this school






