Black Water Treatment Every old-time horseman was quick to recognize a case of azoor black water. Sometimes called "Monday morning sickness." the onset is surprisingly sudden. It invariably occurs when well-fed horses are put back to work after a couple of days of rest. Patchy sweating breaks out, the muscles remble, the hind quarters seem weak, and, if kept moving, the horse goes down with terrific pain. The urine becomes the color of strong

Dr. J. W. Patton, a Michigan nutrition chemist, firmly believes that he has discovered a cure, or at least a real help, for this age-old killer of good horses. His treatment, surprisingly enough, is heavy doses of thiamin hydrochloride (vitamin B1) directly into the neck vein. It is based on the theory that carbohydrate metabolism is upset and that muscle sugar is not utilized properly because the "kicker," thi-amin, has disappeared.

# Weather Robots

It was not the meteorologist's fault that Normandy was invaded in weather of the kind that General Eisenhower did not want. Prewar nternational weather service had been disrupted. Nobody knew exactly what the temperature, humidity, barometric pressure and wind volocity were in distant parts of the earth, and without that information prediction was hazardous. The weather of any place is not made on the spot but several housand miles av/ay.

This being so, the army and navy have erected automatic veather stations in many parts of the world, from the Arctic circle to the tropics. How many there are the government has not disclosed. The facts about the weather are gathered by automatic instru whereupon they are signaled by ra-dio at regular times to this country
