The product is valuable as a grease, but not as a food, and its recovery and use from waste products is just another example of American ingenuity.

Work Clothing More and better quality work clothing is expected to result from the recent releases of 40,000,000 yards of grey herringbone drills. made to Army specifications, for use in civilian work clothing. They will cost the consumer slightly more than ordinary work clothing since the material is more expen sive than that usually used for this purpose. However, prices will be no more than would have been charged if these more expensive drills had been used for work clothing in March 1942. A temporary reduction in Army needs makes
