At His Home in Cascade Bonding Proposal To Be Submitted

THE LOWITH JUNGS

Lowell Citizens to Vote on Question of New Source Of Water Supply; Special Election to be Held Saturday, June 29; Bond Issue Approximately \$48,000

A special meeting of the Village Council was held Friday, June 7, to make final plans for the financing of the two greatest problems confronting the village at the frequent time, namely, a new source of water supply and the completion of our present sewer system.

It is possible to bond the village (general obligation bonds) for 10 percent of its assessed valuation if the bonding issue is carried by two-thirds majority of the popular vote of property-owning residents of the village. This means, accordingly, that the total amount for which the village may bond, or borrow, is approximately \$132,000.

The total cost of the water supply, sewer completion and correct.

for which the village may bond, or borrow, is approximately \$132,000. The total cost of the water supply, sewer completion and correction of the present underground water system (mains, shut-offs, etc.) as estimated by Mr. Albert Roth, engineer, is \$160,500.

Therefore, is is obvious that both proposals cannot be carried to completion at this time in view of the fact that we will not be able to borrow within \$28,500 of the amount needed to finish both pro-

These figures were as much a disappointment to the village council as they will be to some of our village residents, as we had thought that the cost of these two projects would come within the limit of the amount for which thevillage could be bonded.

It was up to the council to decide which project should be put to a vote of the people for completion at this time. Realizing the seriousness of both problems, it was decided that the new source of water supply was the most urgent; and the sewer proposal was tabled, through lack of necessary funds, to be taken up at a later

The total cost of the new suter supply, including test wells, the new well, water main pipe, labor, etc., will be approximately \$48,000, which amount can be borrowed by the village at the interest rate of 2 percent or less. The location of the new well will be about one-half mile northwest of Lowell on Foreman Drive.

Everyone who owns property and is a resident of the village will have the opportunity to vote his approval or disapproval for the village to borrow the above amount of \$48,000, by general village obligation bonds, for the completion of this project.

The date set for the special election is Saturday, June 29, 1946, so remember this: In order for the village to have a new supply of water, the bending issue must carry by two-thirds majority vote. Therefore, it is now up to the property-owning residents of the village to go to the poils and vote "Yes" or "No" on this proposal.
