Kent County potato growers we commented on a week ago when we commented on a question about alfalfa stands that two of our good dairy farmers put to me.

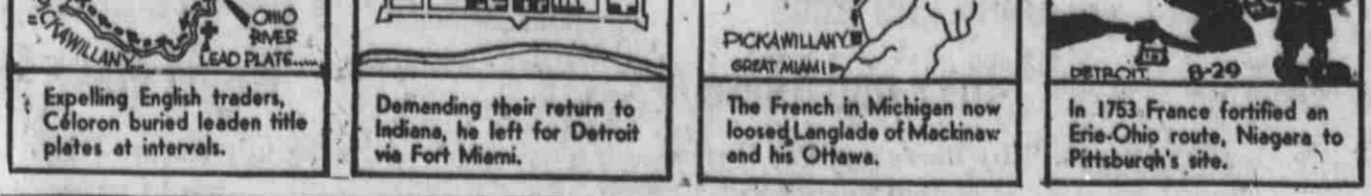




