

# Michigan Briefs Of Big Interests

News About Your State on

One out of every four voting citizens in the United States will be veterans of World War II. Care for veterans of all previous wars cost \$35 billion up to 1945. Cost of the new GI Bill of Rights may finally cost more than \$50 billion, according to the U. S. News. A federal bonus, similar to that granted after World War I, would add \$10 to \$15 billion. Prediction: Vote-hungry candidates will soon advocate a federal bonus for our 20 million veterans.

Washington commentators hint that behind the firm of Henry Wallace by President Truman was the unified front put up by United States Senators Vandenberg of Michigan and Connally of Texas. Wallace is stamping Michigan industrial centers this month, while Vandenberg is in Paris.

Michigan's penal system, object of a legislative investigation this year, is given a top rating by the American Prison Association's corrections congress in session at Detroit. Dr. Garrett Heyns is the Michigan director. The legislative report will go to the 1947 state legislature in January.

The Civilian Productions Administration refused to authorize repairs at the Coliseum at the state fairgrounds, Detroit. The 1947 state fair cannot be held unless the building is repaired. To improve its veterans' housing village, largest on any college campus in the nation, Michigan State College has inaugurated its own fire department with six firemen and two fire engines on 24-hour duty.

Because of the increased cost of state conservation services, the next legislature will be asked to approve an increase in hunting and fishing fees. Anglers and small game hunters would pay \$2 instead of \$1; deer hunters \$3.50 instead of \$2.25; and trappers \$2 instead of \$1.50.

To meet transportation competition of the Pere Marquette streamlined trains operating between Grand Rapids, Lansing and Detroit, the Great Lakes Greyhound Lines are inaugurating three round-trip express buses daily. Another illustration of free enterprise.

Michigan's one-man grand jury system received flattering praises from Sanford Bates, noted correctionist. The Lansing grand jury's funds were down to \$8,000 last week, and the "little legislature" has been requested to appropriate \$50,000 more. Approximately \$60,000 have been expended so far.

Union brick layers working on Michigan State College's \$5,000,000 construction program get \$2 an hour or \$80 for 40 hours' work. Average pay, including overtime, runs \$126. The average weekly wage of college instructors is \$27. Roll your own!

Government ownership and operation of the copper industry—along with industries producing lead, zinc, aluminum, magnesium, gold and silver—are proposed by the C. I. O. Mine, Mill and Smelter-workers' Union. This union bargains for more than 180,000 workers. Copper mining in Michigan is now regulated by a federal "premium price plan" which provides for government subsidies. The same C. I. O. union recently defeated a proposal to bar communists from holding office.

Midland's Dow Chemical company has a \$50 million expansion program, but cannot proceed due to a housing shortage and lack of needed equipment.

The Michigan Unemployment Compensation commission, with its 2,300 employees, will take over about mid-November the federal employment service with around 1,200 employees. While salaries are paid from federal funds, the next governor will have a bigger payroll to account for. There are 72 local employment offices in the state, and 65 part-time offices.

The eighth report to the President and to Congress by the director of war mobilization and reconversion at Washington sounds unusual danger signs. If we are to avert a serious depression in the near future, business must act to hold down prices "wherever possible," labor leaders must resist demands for spiraling wage increases, farmers must maintain their high level of production, and consumer must spend their money wisely.

Consumer inability to buy meat is creating a boom demand for cheese with a result of higher prices. Milk prices may climb until January. A movement is under way to require pasteurization of milk for

Price controls on meat were thrown out the window on Tuesday, the President having altered the course he had previously set. The action was in response to a nationwide clamor for decontrol. Without doubt a few weeks' time will elapse before meat begins to reach the counters in large quantities, although local slaughtering will doubtless help the situation soon.

## Bank Bandit Held Must Face Trial

### His Arrest Recalls Brutal Shooting on Main-St. On May 24, 1932

The brutal slaying of Charles A. Knapp, Lowell motorcycle officer, on Main street Tuesday, May 24, 1932, was recalled by Lowell citizens, with the arrest of Vincent Henry, 46, at Bayonne, N. J., last Saturday. Kent county officers left Monday to bring Henry back to Michigan to face trial for bank robbery. He was one of the four men who robbed the Wealthy-st. branch bank of Grand Rapids, 14 years ago.

Mr. Knapp was fatally wounded when he tried to stop the bandit car as it went through Lowell and died later in an ambulance on the way to the hospital.

Mike Litchevski, King Milling Co. employee, was returning from lunch, driving his car slowly on the street. He saw Mr. Knapp motion the bandit car to the side of the road, then saw one of the men pull a gun and fire at Mr. Knapp. Kenneth Smith, who was 10 years old at the time, was grazed on the cheek by a bullet when the gunman fired at the officer.

**Lowell Men Pursue Bandits**  
Deputy Pat Bowes and Tony Gazella were first to pursue the bandits as they left Lowell. Paul Kellogg, who had been on the look-out, was getting gas for his car, and as the bandit car whizzed by, followed by Bowes and Gazella, Kellogg jumped in his car and soon overtook the two officers. Gazella got in with Kellogg, as the latter's car was speedier, so one could handle a gun while the other drove. A. H. Stornand and Dr. J. R. Stryker were also in close pursuit.

The bandits eluded the officers by turning north on a road just east of Lowell and a general search was made in an area north and east of town and near Smyrna.

**Stolen Money Found**  
About \$1,300 of bank currency, wrapped in the paper binders as it was when stolen by one of the three gunmen who entered the bank, was found buried under brush in a woods less than half a mile from the general store in Smyrna, late that night.

Henry Marshall of Detroit is serving a life term at the state's branch prison at Marquette for the murder of Deputy Knapp. James Gallagher, alias Galloway, the murder of Deputy Knapp, was also of Detroit, sentenced to serve also a 20-year sentence in the southern Michigan prison after having pleaded guilty to a bank robbery charge. has now been released on parole.

Another suspect, Carroll Johnson, also has been sought in connection with the robbery. Another man, Harry Gold, received a 40-year prison sentence as an accessory. He was convicted of permitting use of his motorcar by the bandits on their trip to Grand Rapids for the robbery.

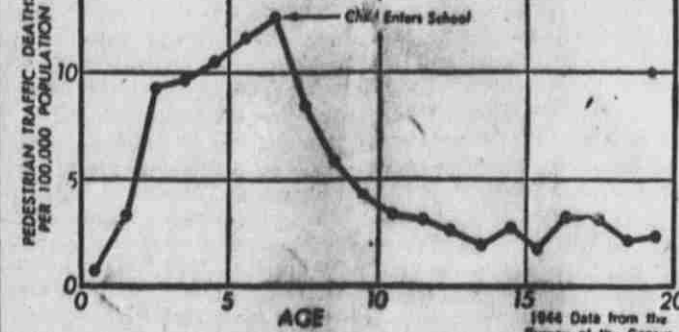
**GUEST NIGHT SUNDAY AT NAZARENE CHURCH**

## Free Chest X-rays By New Mobile Unit At Ada and Parnell

The residents of Ada and Parnell will have the privilege of having free chest x-rays with the new Mobile Unit X-ray Unit of our county Tuberculosis Society on October 23.

A program of health education, tuberculin tests and chest x-rays has been planned for Ada and St. Patrick's high schools. Talks about the prevention of tuberculosis will be offered to children of all grades.

Testing will be done on October 18, 21 and 23 at 8:45 in Ada and about 10:30 a. m. in St. Patrick's school.

On October 23 the xray unit will be hooked up at Ada school in the morning to xray the chests of all positive reactors and anybody in the community who wants this service. In the afternoon the bus will perform similar service for the residents of Parnell community.

"This is the only way we can reach the adults of Kent County and, since tuberculosis is now a problem among people past forty, they are an important group," stated Mrs. Blanche H. deKoning, executive secretary of the tuberculosis society. "We also know that early tuberculosis, which is easily controlled, shows no symptoms or illness."

## Odds and Ends Here and There

### Pithy Points Picked Up and Pasty Put by Peripatetic Pencil Pusher

Approximately 25,000 Michigan teen-age boys and girls helped relieve the farm labor situation during 1946 as Victory Farm Volunteers. (These youths filled 41,027 jobs in every county in the state.)

Fair to good shooting and the finding of more water inland than was anticipated after the drought marked the "summer weather" opening of the 45-day duck season.

Conservation department officials have declared the 10 a. m. starting hour on the first two days of pheasant season will be strictly enforced where necessary, but they are confident the great majority of bird hunters with real concern for their sport will do a good job of policing themselves.

Michigan's first modern bear hunt with dogs will be in Missaukee county October 22-25 Harry Gaines, secretary of Michigan United Conservation Clubs, announced after signing up H. T. Smithdeal of Johnson City, Tenn., with his hounds and eight handlers. Headquarters of the hunt will be at Houghton Lake, and the number of hunters may be limited to 100.

An intensive investigation by the justice department and FBI has found no evidence of collusion or conspiracy by industry to create meat shortages. High justice department officials said the inquiry yielded nothing to substantiate charges that cattle growers and packers were creating artificial shortages in order to destroy OPA and get higher prices.

Do you want to pay a bigger sales tax? You now pay three percent on everything you eat or wear or buy for any purpose. A study of the State's finances will convince anyone that if the amendment diverting a third of the sales tax to other units of government is adopted we will have to either raise the sales tax to four or five cents on the dollar or else find some new way to tax folks. Make up your mind early to vote no on this amendment, and then do it Nov. 5.—Cassopolis Vigilant.

## Your Social Security And How To Get Most In Provided Benefits

Social security in the United States takes in a vast number of workers. Many of these workers are at a loss as to when to do what, in order to get maximum benefits provided under the law.

Information put out by the Social Security Administration so that older workers, veterans and those who have lost cards can keep themselves informed on proper procedure, is sometimes overlooked. Here is the latest data on your benefits, if you have a social security card.

There are two main times for action. If you are 65, you should contact a field office of the S. S. Administration. It will probably be to your advantage to file your claim for old-age and survivors' insurance. If you do not file at 65 and then become ill, the benefit will not be as high as it would if you had filed promptly at 65.

The second time you should take immediate action is when a worker in your family dies. A member of the deceased worker's family should immediately contact the Social Security Administration and file a claim for the deceased's insurance. Certain proofs should be presented—proof of marriage, proof of age, proof of death, and proof of paternity as to children—each should have a birth certificate.

Veterans who are returning to jobs, or with new jobs, who have lost their security numbers, can apply to the nearest social security field office for a duplicate. Any veteran with a new job and no number can obtain one by mail, but the administration prefers that the employee call in person at the nearest field office. Forms for mailing are available at most post offices.

## How Michigan Became The Wolverine State

Michigan became the "Wolverine State" because of its prosperous trading centers, not because wolverines were especially numerous in the state, a University of Michigan zoologist declares.

Dr. William H. Burt, associate professor of zoology and curator of mammals in the University's Museum of Zoology, is the author of "The Mammals of Michigan," just released by the University of Michigan Press.

"Detroit and other Michigan cities were shipping centers for the fur trade," Dr. Burt explains, "and Michigan became known as the Wolverine State because of the great number of wolverine skins shipping through the state. Actually most of the skins came from outside Michigan."

A total of 64 different species of mammals are now or have been in the past native to Michigan, Dr. Burt relates, but the commercial and agricultural practices of the state have created many changes in the nature and distribution of wildlife.

Wipe floor with cold water after washing—Always wipe up the floor with a rag wrung out of cold water after the scrubbing process. It is almost as important as the loosening of the dirt. Do not let small puddles of water stand about after mopping up the floor. They will soften the wood, causing the floor to splinter easily, and if left on linoleum will cause it to blister.

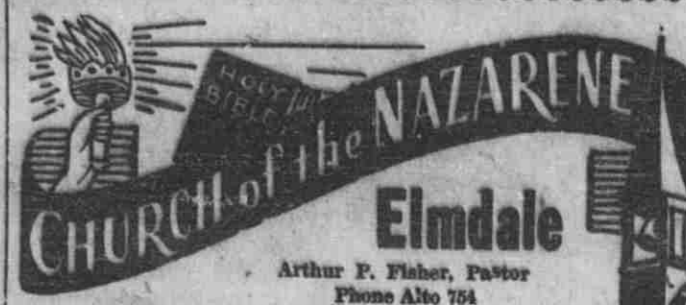
