Their Daily Bread is Now Rationed. THE DARKEST DAYS of the war did not bring to Britons bread rationing, but now, in another of their efforts to relief the world food shortage, they are underpinning it. Top: London housewife Mrs. Elizabeth Crocker shows her daily ration—cut into four slices (left) and on the loaf (right). Bottom: The daily amount allotted various people. Left to right: 1.0 for children under one year, 2.0 for the average person (the same amount as Mrs. Crocker's, but cut from a much smaller loaf), 1.0 for expectant mothers, and 1.5 for men who do heavy manual work. Bread points can be exchanged for flour or cream, butter and almost any other rationed goods, but Britons, struggling along on one or more rations than wartime rationing of most foods, had to cut in bread—it had become a chief item in their diet—a hard task to take.
