Quality of Hay

Affects Grade of Milk

Experiments by dairy specialists of the U. S. department of agriculture show that not only the quantity of the milk but the quality of the milk is directly affected by the quality of the hay in the cow's ration. The department dairymen find that when they feed U. S. No. 1 alfalfa hay which is leafy-green colored, or other high-quality legume-stored roughage or winter grazing rich in carotene or vitamin A, the winter milk produced by their cows is potent in vitamin A and is much more valuable as a food. But when they feed cows U. S. No. 3 grass hay or even a low quality legume hay, they find the vitamin A potency of the milk is only one-half to two-thirds that of the average winter milk produced in this country and carries much less value.

What's more, they find that is true even when the poor-grade timothy hay is supplemented with enough vitamin A in the form of cod liver oil to preserve the health of the cow and to permit her to bear a normal calf. Then, too, vitamin A is only one thing in which poor grade hay is short. Compared to high-quality hay it also lacks calcium and digestible protein.

Kills Ragweed

The fact that 2,4-D (2,4-Dichlorophenoxyacetic acid) kills many weeds, including ragweed, has led to reports that it is a cure for hay fever. In some statements that have come to the attention of the department of agriculture, the chemical has been referred to as a drug and as "an aid in the cure of hay fever." Because of the evident misunderstanding of the uses of this chemical, department weed experts and specialists on allergies caused by plants and plant products have joined in a statement that "the department has not spoken of 2,4-D as a drug and has not suggested it as 'an aid in the cure of hay fever.'" Fortunately, says L. W. Kephart, weed specialist of the Plant Industry Station, Beltsville, Md., 2,4-D either kills ragweed or keeps it from producing pollen. Ragweed ordinarily produces great quantities of pollen and is the principal cause of hay fever in the United States. Kephart says there are several other chemicals besides 2,4-D that will kill ragweed. These other herbicides are: certain di-nitro compounds, sodium chlorate with reduced fire hazard, plain sodium chlorate, and ammonium thiocyanate. Such weed killers are usually obtainable at hardware stores or from dealers in farm supplies.

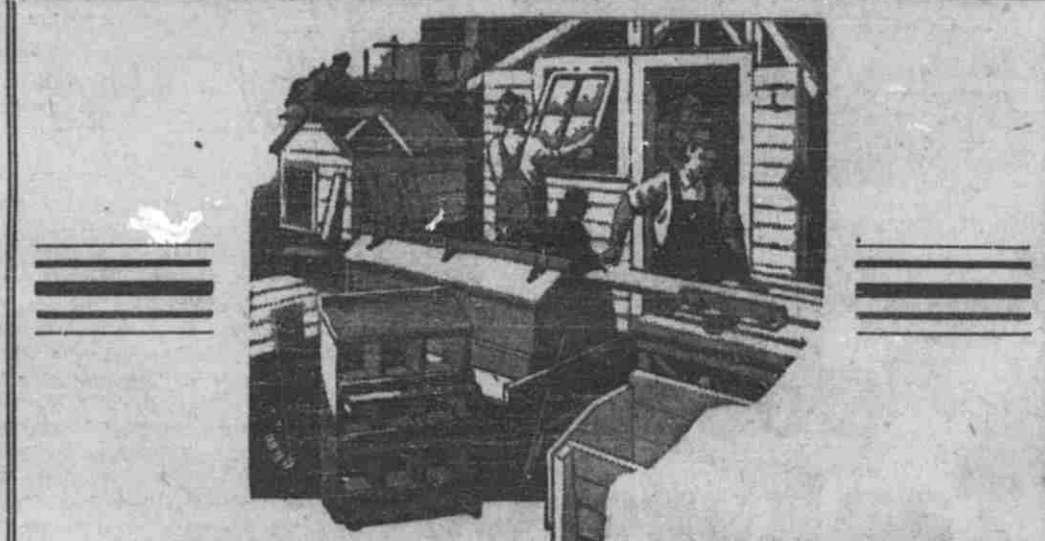
