



Practical Pockets

Pockets may be practical as well as decorative. House dresses, aprons, play suits and garden clothes will be more convenient and satisfactory if pockets are made fully useful. On the skirt, pockets should be placed where the hands slip in naturally without fumbling for the opening. Because arms differ in length, the location of the pocket needs to be tried out before final stitching is done. To make pockets durable, reinforce top corners where the greatest strain comes. A strip of tape, basted on the underside of the dress across the top pocket line, can be stitched on with the pocket to give corner strength. A double row of stitching across the top of the pocket itself also helps to keep the pocket from
